When he first started his work on behalf of the Toledo street urchins Mr. Gunckel said that he gathered 102 of them off the street, and gave them a big Christmas dinner. This dinner was well policed, but notwithstanding this fact there were five fights, and it took but 11 minutes to clean the tables. One boy he found who tore a piece of his sleeve with which he tied up his trouser's leg at the bottom, thus forming a receptacle for apples, doughnuts, pie, and all manner of edibles.

"If you want to make a success in the world, get in touch with everyone." This, Mr. Gunckel insists, is the only way to make men respect you. He claims to be in personal touch with some ten thousand boys all over the world. All of these he has either seen personally, or corresponds with.

Mr. Gunckel closed with an appeal to all men to stop cigarette smoking, which he claims is the cause of many life failures and divorce cases.

"I don't care what a man's creed or religion is. If he does not approve of lying, swearing, stealing, gambling, cigarettes, or drinking intoxicating liquors, he is a man fit for heaven."
