**Trial Heats Run on Friday
Beginning at Three
O'clock**

TECH STOCK RISING

**Dartmouth Picked to Win, Bowdoin
for Second and Tech for
Third Place**

The twenty-third annual track meet of the New England Intercollegiate Athletic Association will be held at the Field, Friday and Saturday. Trial heats will be held Friday and finals on Saturday. Without doubt Dartmouth will be the winner. Bowdoin seems to have the best chance for second place, which they secured last year by one point over Technology and Wesleyan. Tech has a good chance for third place, but will be hard pressed by Williams and Amherst.

The order of events for Friday, which began at three o'clock are as follows: Track events; 440-yard run, 120-yard hurdles, 220-yard hurdles, 880-yard run; field events: putting the shot, running high jump, throwing the hammer, running broad jump, throwing the discus, and the pole vault.

The Institute Committee has decided to throw open the Union to the visiting athletes and college men next Friday night after the preliminaries, from 8 to 9:30. This will be the first Tech "At Home," and it needs the support of every man at the Institute.

The committee has arranged to have stunts from the Show and numbers by the Musical Clubs and the Tech orchestra. The affair is to be informal, and it is given for the purpose of promoting good fellowship between the colleges of New England. Several colleges have been heard from, and between 150 and 200 guests are expected.

There will be no smoking in the main room on account of the athletes, but free cigarettes and beer will be provided in the side rooms. The managers of the visiting teams will be given free tickets to the Union. To defray the costs of the refreshments that will be served, a committee composed of H. Webb 1909, M. Flagg 1909, G. ISSUE NEW BOOK TO BOOM INSTITUTE

**Alumni and Undergraduates
Plan Publication to
Attract Men**

POINTS OF INTEREST

**Hundred Page Book Will Display
Bright Side of Tech Life
to Possible Students**

"Concerning the Institute of Technology" is the title of a book about to be published by a board of undergraduates and alumni.

A new and important period of Institute life is now beginning, and the purpose of this book is to arouse in the freshman and in the school boy, not yet at college, a better knowledge of Technology life and ideals. It is hoped that it will attract men to the Institute who now know nothing of that other side of Tech life which often appeals most to the school boy.

The growth and prominence of the Institute will be touched, and advice from the heads of the courses and practicing engineers will help men to choose rightly. The support of the alumni as well as their representation on Corporation and Faculty will be discussed. The various Institute activities will all be referred to in this attempt to give a new man a clearer and pleasanter conception of the place.

The book will contain about 100 pages and a few photographs. The cost will be met by advertisements and subscriptions. These advertisements will be of three classes, first of a very commercial nature, such as clothing and domestic firms, secondly of corporations in which Tech men are interested, and thirdly of the professional card of many graduates. These last two will give much interesting information as to what Tech men do in the world. The book will be spread through the country by the Alumni Organizations.

Hundreds will make Symphony Hall, Nahant and Nantasket bright scenes of excitement. By traffic agreements with the various trunk line associations, the round trip fare has been reduced to 1 3-5 of the single fare.

On the second evening, present indications are that Symphony Hall will be crowded as it never has been at any previous Pops Concert.

A member of the cabinet has accepted the invitation to speak at the grand banquet. This banquet on the last evening is certain to be one of the largest ever held in New England, and will tax the capacity of the hall. The committee is even now assured of over 1,200 men at tables.

In the evening there will be dancing and Tech songs.
