Coville, Farrington, and Parker in Semifinal Round of Tournament

A tennis game with Wesleyan will be played this morning before the beginning of the Intercollegiate tournament at Longwood on Monday.

The rating of the ten best players has been greatly changed in the past two weeks, and in accordance with the present rating, Captain T. B. Parker 1911, F. W. Covill 1911, L. Pritchett 1909, and H. P. Farrington will represent Technology in the games against Wesleyan today. L. Pritchett 1909, has rapidly climbed from sixth to third place, defeating T. B. Whittemore 1910, P. M. Wentworth 1909, and H. P. Farrington 1909. R. Runells 1911, has disappeared from the list and C. R. Woodward 1912, has captured ninth place by defeating D. V. Williamson 1910.
