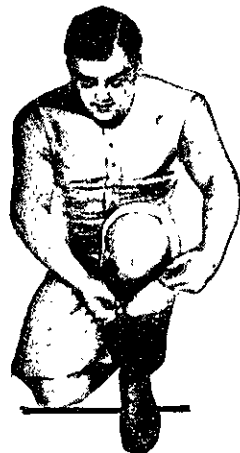


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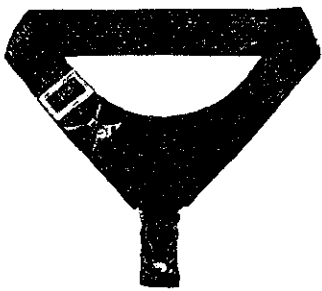

Five more men have been elected to positions on the Board of Editors of Technique 1911.

John Lavelle McAllen of Portland, Oregon will act as treasurer. McAllen ran both years on the 1911 relay team and is secretary of the Mining Engineering Society.

The vote for second assistant in the business staff went Donald Cambell Bakewell, A. B., of Pittsburg, Penn. Bakewell is a graduate of Yale. He played goal on the hockey team last winter and was a member of the 1911 football team. He has had experience on the paper published at the Hotchkiss Military Academy.

Lloyd Cartwright Cooley of Brookline, Mass., was unanimously elected to the position of athletic editor. Cooley served for four years on his preparatory school paper, holding the position of athletic editor there. At the Institute he has been both years manager of the 1911 relay team, ran against Harvard in the cross country race of 1907, is a member of the class board of directors, won the mile handicap last fall and is a member of the entertainment committee.

The history editor is to be Wellesley Joseph Seligman, also of Brookline. Seligman is chiefly known by his running ability. He was both years the fastest man on the class relay team, and has won many points in the interclass meets. He won his T by placing in the Intercollegiate 220-yard dash last year. He was a joint author with Stevens of this year's 1911 class history in Technique and served for two years on his prep school paper.

Theodore Bissell Parker of Marblehead, Mass., was elected Professor's editor. Parker is known because of his athletic ability in all branches of sport and as an officer of his class. He is the vice-president of the class of 1911, was on the basketball team this year, and is captain of next year's team. He was on the 1911 Tug-of-War team and on the 1911 baseball team, and is the captain of the tennis team, and president of the Tennis Association.

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
