Foundations are now being laid for a new vivarium for the biological department of Princeton University. A botanical garden will be laid out in connection with it and also a green house for winter use. The particular aim of the vivarium is to make possible a study of the habits of many amphibious animals, about which there has been little accurate scientific knowledge heretofore, on account of their habit of burying themselves in the mud along the streams. When completed, this will be the first of its kind in this country, although the University of Chicago is making plans for a similar building.

Tech Show 1909 is to have a great big buzz wagon for Field Day this year. take his place. However, a rule was made for the benefit of this man, that he was not required to play but one match each week, in order that pressure of work might not cause him to abandon his place.

From the list on May 1st, the first two will be chosen to represent the Institute at the Intercollegiate Tournament at Longwood. For other tournaments and games with other colleges, the first four on the list will be selected.

Although the men were selected last year, graduation and withdrawal has diminished the list so that the ranking as now posted reads: 1, Parker; 2, Coville; 3, Sweet; 4, Wentworth; 5, Harkness; 6, Whittemore; 7, Williamson; 8, Price. After the tournament the list will be regraded and perhaps increased again to its former size.

CURRENT EVENTS

French papers declare that it is now time for France to interfere in the Spanish conquest of Morocco, in order to save the economic and political interests of Africa, as Teza, which is the natural outlet of Algeria to the Atlantic, is likely to fall before the Spanish troops. Spaniards declare King Alfonso weak and without prestige, and a revolution not only possible, but easy and necessary.

Annapolis is about to challenge West Point to contest with them this winter in basketball, gymnastics, rifle shooting, and fencing. The authorities favor rifle matches, and if dual fencing is adopted, the two academies would probably withdraw from the association.

A bill is now before the Canadian Parliament to provide for twelve warships to be built in the next six years at the expense of twenty millions.

President Taft is now in California, where he spent the last three days in sightseeing and restful traveling. He will not speak again until Sunday, when he reaches Fresno.
