

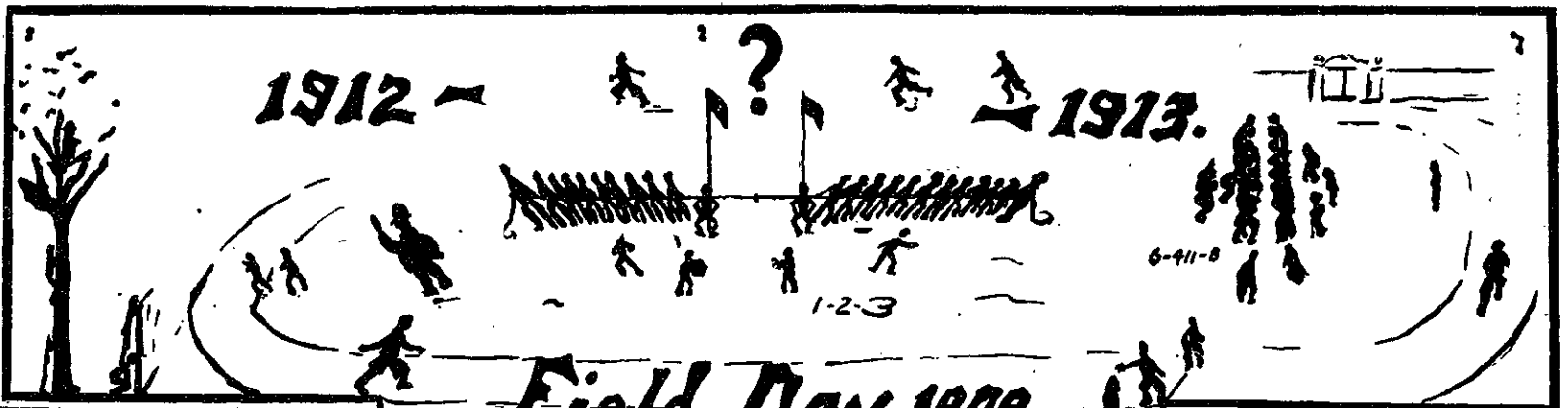

## NINTH ANNUAL FIELD DAY AT TECH

## FIELD, BROOKLINE, THIS AFTERNOON

## Sophomores and Freshmen in Football Game, Relay Race and Tug-of-War

With all the teams in the pink of condition, the sophomores and freshmen will clash this afternoon in their annual meet at Tech Field.

For over a month the football, relay and tug-of-war teams have been preparing for this eventful day and all are now eagerly awaiting the moment for the test of their strength and endurance, and the time when they will compete for the honor of their respective classes.

The sophomores have the decided advantage of one year's experience, but the freshmen have an advantage which offsets this—a much greater enthusiasm. The present sophomores have already won a Field Day and the freshmen, fearing a possible repetition of an odd-year class losing two successive Field Days, will put all their strength into today's conflict in the hope of gaining a victory over a class which has already shown its mettle by defeating the class of 1911.

With the exception of Captain Eicher, the sophomore gridiron warriors have no individual stars on their roster, but each man is one of a whole which should help towards victory.

On the other hand, the freshman teams are practically unknown, because of the slight chance which has been offered in which to draw any final conclusions as to their abilities. Nevertheless the class of 1913 has undoubtedly some of the strongest teams any first year class at the Institute has ever had.

The sophomores have the advantage of some fairly good sprinters on their team, but the showing of the freshmen in the dashes at the Fall Relay Handicap Meet was excellent. In any event it will be an exceptionally close race and good time should be made, though the record for the distance will undoubtedly stand.

The freshmen have a medium weight eleven, but the sophomore team is not much heavier in comparison, except on the line. The plays will probably be somewhat open, as the sophomore coach has been developing this style during the season. The sophomores' ends should be able to do some good work on the forward passes. The fresh-
