FRESHMEN DEFEAT

The relay race was another great match and it was not until Oettinger had breasted the tape in the final relay that the sophomores were sure of a victory.

Walker left the mark for the sophomores and with him the first freshman ran shoulder to shoulder. So, throughout the entire relays each pair battled until the tape had been reached.

Nineteen thirteen won the day but they were opposed by a class who fought gamely to the end and it will probably be many years before another meet is held in which the final result is deferred until the last minute.

A detailed account of each event follows with every play in the football game, every lap of the relay, and every pull of the tug-of-war outlined.

FOOTBALL.

With the cheer of 1912 in their ears the sophomore eleven ran onto the field a few minutes after two o'clock. The freshmen did not appear on the field until referee Hallohan called for the teams to line up.

The teams lined up at 2:30, Eicher winning the toss and picking the north goal. A strong northwest wind favored the twelve men.

Beebe kicked off to Eicher who caught it on the 25-yard line and ran it back 10 yards. Robertson gained 13 yards on a skin-tackle play. 1912 then fumbled but recovered it. Raymond made two yards around right end. Roberts went through left tackle. Whittlesey then punted, on third down to the 30-yard line. Goff, 1913 got the ball and ran it back 13 yards, then on a delayed pass to Goff no gain was made. Wilfert got two and Beebe kicked to 1912's 35-yard line, Eicher capturing the ball and gained four yards. Wilfert went through left tackle for 15 yards. 1913 then lost the ball and Robinson went around right end for two yards. Raymond went through for two yards, then Whittlesey kicked, Barnes regaining the ball on the 28-yard line. Raymond then took the ball for no gain, but on a second play through the same point captured two. Barnes made four through left tackle. Kimball carried

the ball around for two yards and Barnes then got three yards. With the ball on 1913's 11-yard line Eicher attempted a drop kick and failed.

The teams then lined up on the 25-yard line, with the ball in possession of the freshmen. Eicher then made five yards, Goff made six and Wilfert failed to make anything. Wilfert again tried and made five yards, Beebe then punted. Eicher captured the ball on the 55-yard line, running it back seven yards. Time was taken out for 1913. A delayed pass around left end gained two yards, Raymond then gain two more. Whittlesey again kicked. Goff captured the ball on the 20-yard line, but was downed by Robinson. Gans made four yards around right end and Eicher made six more. Goff then made five and four more through guard. Fallon then made six yards outside tackle on a quarter-back play. Goff made six yards and on a fumble by 1913 Torrey captured the ball.

Raymond then made two yards. Forward pass Eicher to Roberts 1912 gained 10 yards. Barnes then made 20 yards through a scattered field. Raymond made six through tackle. Barnes gained nine yards in three consecutive plays. Raymond gained one yard. With a yard and a half to go, Raymond was held on the 12-yard line. 1913 received the ball and Eicher made three yards. Goff then made four and Eicher five. Goff made one yard. Time out for 1913. Wilfert hurt. Wilfert then made nine yards. Goff then made one. Beebe punted, Roberts, 1912 captured the ball and made three yards. Raymond was thrown back two yards by Gibson.

Third down, 1912's ball. Eicher passed the ball to Robinson for 35 yards gain. A second forward pass netted no gain for 1912. Barnes took the ball for eight yards, then made six, Raymond took the ball for no gain. Eicher then tried a drop kick, but failed. Ball was then brought to 25-yard line. Cahill replaced Block. Eicher gained five. End of first half.

Second Half.

Nineteen thirteen entered second half of game with same line-up. Whittlesey was replaced by Swenson, Shuttleworth taking Swenson's place.

Nineteen twelve kicked off to 1913. Beebe kicking. Beale captured the ball on a fumble, Barnes made seven yards and again made five. Time out for Barnes. 1912 fumbled and 1913 captured ball. Goff then made six through left tackle. Wilfert made two yards. Beebe kicked to 32-yard line, Eicher capturing the ball. Eicher tried a forward pass, but Goff intercepted pass and Eicher fell on it.

Nineteen thirteen made a forward pass, but Eicher captured it. Raymond tackled Beebe for a loss. Barnes made four. Eicher kicked. Goff capturing the ball and ran it back seven yards. Time out for Beale and Goff. The ball collapsed in the collision of Beale and Goff and new ball was put in.

Eichorn made 12 yards, Fallon then made 25 yards, placing the ball on 1912's 42 yard line. Time out for Freeman. Goff made eight yards. McOsher replaces Roberts. Wilfert made four yards and Eichorn gets two. Goff gets three. Eichorn goes through for 10 yards, but 1913 was penalized five yards. Goff makes two yards. Left half loses two yards. Goff makes field goal from 20-yard line.

Nineteen thirteen kicks off. Beale captures ball on 31-yard line, Eicher fumbles on 38-yard line, but regains ball and left end goes round for 12 yards. Goff makes no gain. On a forward pass Torrey made 12 yards. Barnes makes four. Gibson replaced by Gage. McOsher makes five. 1912 penalized 15 yards for hurdling, placing them on the 25-yard line. Eicher

1912 AND 1913 CAPTURE COLONIAL AND HOLD ANNUAL FESTIVAL OCCASION

Elsie Janis in The "Fair Co-Ed" is the Supreme Attraction of the Evening

At the close of "The Fair Co-Ed" last night, with the orchestra, a tangle of serpentine and the 1913 balloons floating triumphantly against the ceiling, the unanimous opinion of the audience, the Technology part, at least, was that Tech Night had been a huge success. During the evening, cheers for the heroes of Field Day, for Dr. MacLaurin, who was present, and for Elsie Janis, were impartially given.

The boxes were occupied by the sophomore teams, the cross-country team, and Technique 1911, while the members of the freshmen teams sat in the front row of the balcony. The freshmen, although not conspicuously placed, managed to make their presence known during the evening, both by their cheering and their balloons. These balloons, 50 in number, which were the ordinary toy balloons filled with hydrogen, were smuggled into the theatre in handboxes, by the individual freshmen, who succeeded without difficulty in passing the sophomore guards. At the close of the first act, these boxes were opened and the balloons, carrying the 1913 numerals, ascended to the ceiling, where they remained during the rest of the evening, to the vexation of the helpless sophomores. The latter, however, were far from silenced and only cheered the louder, especially when the 1912 flags were seen on the stage.

The play itself took the audience by storm. Although Bingham College was not the Institute, several of the situations were singularly apropos, the military features especially. Who, indeed, was not forcibly reminded of Wednesday afternoon, when he saw the Bingham cadets move across the stage in military precision. Then, too, the remarks of "Prof. Cadvallader," "On behalf of the faculty," called forth much applause. The fair co-ed, herself, however, was the best of the evening, every appearance being the signal for cheers

and applause. At the close of the second act, Miss Janis, in a curtain speech, said that she and the company had looked forward to Tech Night with some little anxiety, as they had feared a possible "rough house" but these fears had proved entirely groundless, and she only had the nicest things to say of the behavior of the audience. The latter endeavored to live up to this reputation, and to prove their helpful spirit, joined in several of the songs and gave added humor to some of the lines by the clever manipulation of rattles and frying-pan gongs.

After the performance the freshmen passed out yelling, "We are fresh, Fresh as hell, T-E-C-H-N-O-L-O-G-Y!" in which opinion the sophomores heartily concurred. The usual snake dance up Boylston Street to Rogers steps did not take place, owing to the lack of anyone to lead it.
