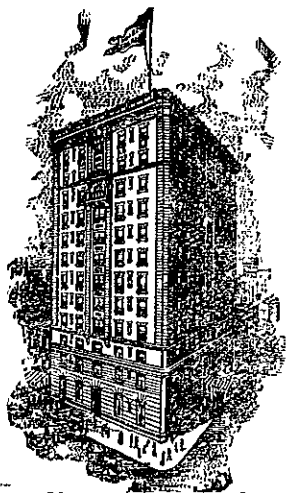

**1913 CELEBRATES**

With the final pull of the tug-of-war, Field Day as such came to an end. The freshmen had won the big event of the year between the two lower classes, and jubilant is not the word to express their feelings. They simply went wild. As soon as the first year men could get their forces together, a march to Rogers' steps was started. The men arranged themselves in the form of a company and the happy band marched all the way to Massachusetts avenue cheering wildly for their class. In front of Symphony Hall, a halt was made, and after some well organized cheering the men proceeded toward Rogers. From Exeter street to the Institute a snake dance was executed; cars and autos being no obstruction to the jubilant freshmen. Finally with a final charge the historic old stone steps were occupied and fully a quarter of an hour cheers were raised for 1913 and Tech. Then a few individual cheers were given for Copeland, Barr, Salisbury, Watkins, and other men who had been prominent in the afternoon's program. After about a half an hour's cheering, the men separated until they should meet again at the theatre.
