President Nicholas Murray Butler of
Columbia, in his annual report to the
trustees, offers the following comment
on the elective system, which, first ap-
plied by President Eliot of Harvard,
has influenced in some degree the cur-
ricula of all American universities:

"The free elective system has broken
down wherever it has been tried. It is
now everywhere to be superseded by a
definite and controlled plan of study
which will not attempt to fit one curri-
culum to every student, but which,
rather will make as many curricula as
there are students, that each may sat-
isfy his own intellectual needs and re-
ceive the training which it is best for
him to have, while having his own indi-
viduality studied and respected."

After spending more than a year in
investigating the scope of the institu-
tions at present located in the North-
west and the general plans and methods
adopted by Eastern colleges, the trust-
ees of the Reed Institute have decided
to utilize the fund of 2,000,000 at their
disposal in the establishment and
maintenance of a college of arts and
sciences in Portland, Ore. This college,
with the endowment at its disposal, it
is expected, will be on the same plane
as Williams or Amherst, or similar
standard institutions of higher learning.
