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1911 DINNER DEC. 10TH JUNIOR PROM. APRIL 19TH

Nomination And Election Of Prom. Committee--Dues Must Be Paid

April 19th is the date of the Junior Prom. The members of the committee which will have charge are each to be nominated by ten of the class. The period during which nominations are in order will be from Monday, Nov. 29th to 4 o'clock Thursday, Dec. 2d. On Monday, Dec. 6th, ballots will be ready for the members of the class, and the polls will be open until Thursday afternoon, Dec. 9th.

The elections will be announced at the class dinner, which takes place in the Union on Friday, Dec. 10th, directly before the Union entertainment.

Only members of the class who have paid all dues, including those for 1909-10 can vote. Dues may be paid before the date of the election to E. A. Nash and his assistants or the amount due, one dollar, may be inserted in the ballot. As there are only two weeks before the election, this matter of dues should be attended to at once.

Seven points are given to the office of a member of the Prom committee, so that men who now have such a number of points to their credit that the additional seven will make their total points exceed ten, must either not run or else must be prepared to resign some office in case they are elected and decide to accept the place on the Prom committee. The election committee wishes to emphasize this fact.

President Copeland will soon appoint the dinner committee of three members and they will make all arrangements for a big time on the 10th. The results of the election are to be kept absolutely secret until the dinner and they alone will be a feature of the evening.

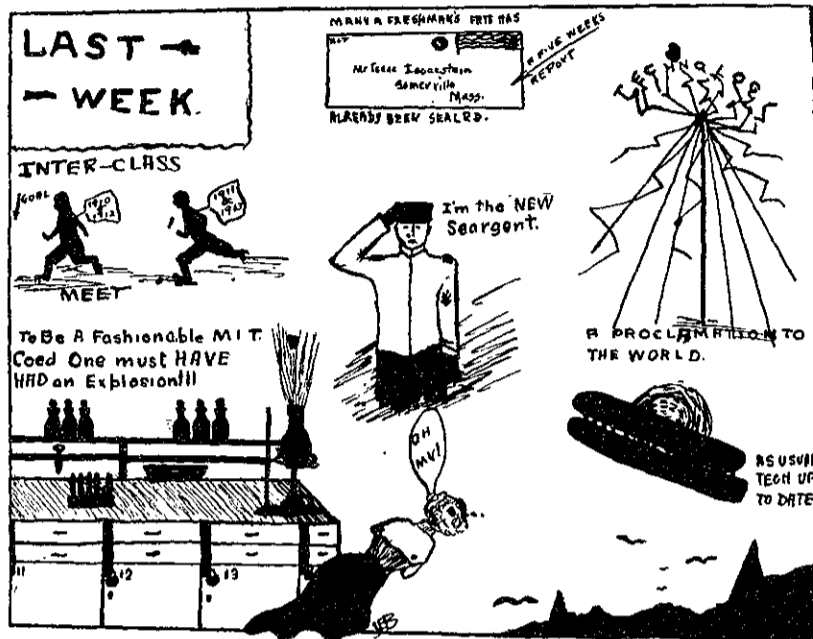
BIOLOGICAL DINNER

M. E. SOCIETY HOLDS SPECIAL MEETING

Changes In Condition To Con- form With That Of A. S. M. E.

A special meeting of the Mechanical Engineering Society was held yesterday afternoon, mainly to change the constitution to conform with that of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

The changes to be made are:
1. To the name Mechanical Engineering Society of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology must be added, "affiliated with the American Society of Mechanical Engineers."

2. There must be added an honorary chairman appointed by the chairman of the A. S. M. E. and a governing board.

3. The word "president" must be changed to "chairman."
The secretary announced that the new shingles would be ready by the end of this week. The price will be fifty cents, and is payable to the secretary. He also announced that all members of the society can subscribe to A. S. M. E. Journal for \$2.00, a deduction of \$3.00 from the regular price of \$5.00.

The following new members were voted in: G. Hawes 1910, J. C. Fuller 1911, C. P. Kerr 1911, H. F. Shaw 1911, W. T. MacCreadie 1911 and G. H. Estes 1911.

The resignation of Donald S. Stevens 1911, from the executive committee was accepted. It was necessary for him to resign on account of Technique work. A. C. Page 1911, was elected to fill his place.

CALCULATING MACHINES

Prof. Derr Gives Closing Lec- ture Of Slide Rule Course
