Members From All Departments Hear Interesting Speeches

Is The Tech Daily a success? "Molly" Scharff says it is; Prof. Pearson says it is; I. W. Litchfield says it looks good to him; W. F. Dolke Jr. says the same.

R. H. Ranger last night introduced some of The Tech's most sturdy supporters to thirty-six members of the staff of the Institute's daily paper.

M. R. Scharff, the President's Secretary, who was a member of The Tech board several years ago, recalled some of the bulls and blunders of his time. He pointed out that similar things happen even in the daily issues of to-day's Tech and that they are certainly amusing when one thinks them over.

Professor Pearson illustrated good points to work for in a paper and also criticized its faults. Placing himself in the position of the average reader, Prof. Pearson pointed out what would be looked for and what would be useless to the Institute students.

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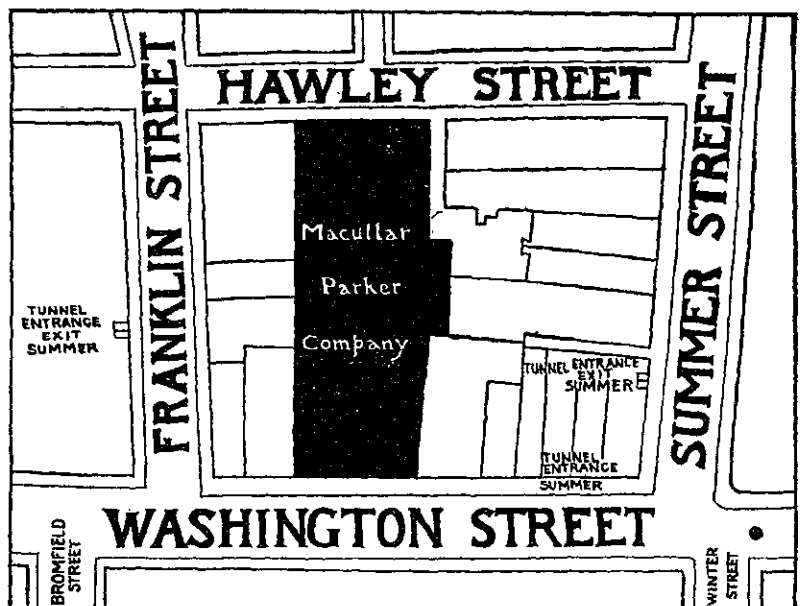
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
