EXPERIENCE IN MEXICO

S. C. Sears '01 To Speak Before The Course III Society

Mr. S. C. Sears 1901, is to be the speaker of the evening at the Mining Engineering Society meeting, in the Union on Thursday evening, and he will speak on "Experience in Mexico."


