## PICTURE PRESENTED

Last Tuesday evening an oil painting of Prof. Sedgewick, was presented to the Institute by a body of past students of his, and was accepted on behalf of the Institute by Pres. MacLarin. In this painting, Prof. Sedgewick appears in the robes Doctor of Science, which degree he received from the University of Yale last June. The picture is the work of William Churchhill, who recently made a painting of the President of Williams College.

## CATHOLIC CLUB

The charities of the St. Vincent de Paul Society was the subject of the talk by Dr. John A. Horgan, who spoke to the members of the Catholic Club last night.

Dr. Horgan has been connected with the State Industrial Board, and is an active member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He introduced his talk with a short historical sketch of the Society, from its origin in the charitable work of a few young men in Paris, seventy-five years ago, to its present organization the world over.

However, the world hears little concerning the work which it does, as this is kept secret; a positive benefit to the poor who are aided, and a mark of true charity in those who do the work. One of the strictest rules of the organization is that of personal visitation of the poor and needy in their own homes.

"For young men doing practical work in charity," Dr. Horgan said, is the object of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and men from all walks in life are wanted, there being a special need of college students and well educated young men.

The three days' convention of the Association of Cosmopolitan Clubs is held at Cornell University from Wednesday to Friday of this week. Although the American Association is only three years old, there are already twenty-three chapters in the colleges of this country. It is now proposed to establish relations with similar student organizations of European universities. During the convention, ground will be broken for a new club house for the Cornell chapter. The aim of the organization is to cultivate the social as well as the scholastic interests of its members. The effects of the movement cannot but show themselves in greater international interchange of students and greater democracy in the colleges.

Prof. Richard F. Nellinger, of the Amherst Department of Physical Education is to be awarded the Varsity "A." It is to be of the track variety.

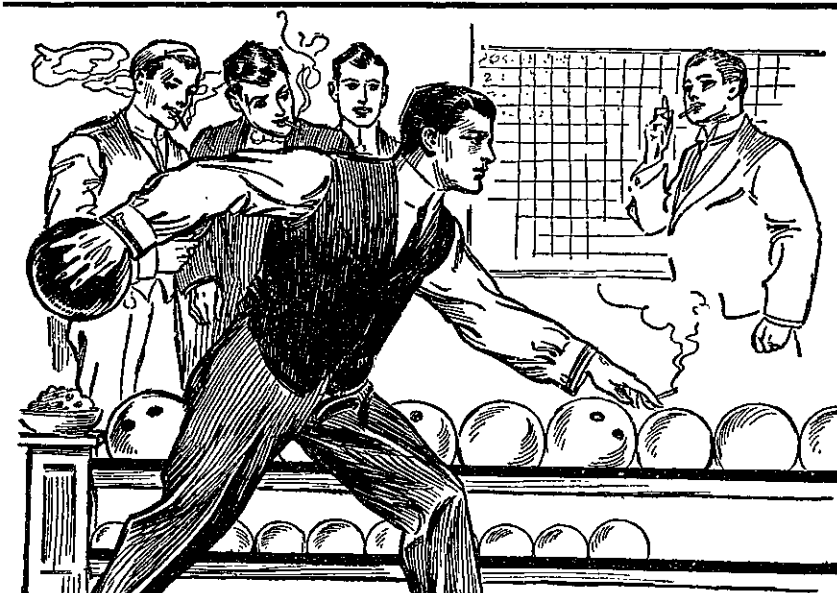
