

STORROW FAVORITE

Straw Ballot Taken In The Union Yesterday Noon

During the noon hour yesterday a straw ballot, concerning the sentiments of the Tech students regarding today's election for mayor, was taken in the living room of the Union. Most of the men admitted that they had no right to vote, but expressed their preference.

Everybody seemed anxious to register their vote and a hundred and fifty straw votes were taken in about ten minutes.

Mr. Storrow was the pronounced favorite and received one hundred and nineteen votes. Fitzgerald was an "also ran," with eighteen votes. Hibbard received nine, while but two had sufficient courage to declare for Taylor. One more claimed to be in favor of woman's suffrage and didn't care who was elected mayor; another favored the election of "James J.," but said that he referred to Jefferies and not Storrow.

One other "voter" said that he lived in Ward 8 and was going to try to register six times for Fitzgerald.

It looks like Storrow, but Fitzgerald should win if the Ward 8 man has anything to do about it.

Taylor, the mayoralty candidate, has submitted the following poem to The Tech:

GYM TEAM PROGRESS

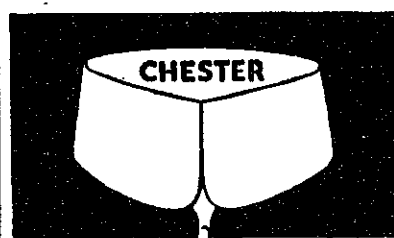

the December meet. The team is handicapped in the tumbling by the loss of R. C. Jacobs, of last year's team, who was unable to return to the Institute this year on account of his health, but R. M. Wilson 1913 has showed up well, as have also H. S. Gott and J. H. White 1912.

"If I had my way I would establish in this city an institution like the Boston School of Technology—a place to which children who show a particular aptitude for drawing or mechanics could receive the higher education they require." The Mayor of Philadelphia is quoted as above by the press of that city.

Columbia University has just established an Athletic Association with the "object of fostering athletic sports at the university." A season ticket scheme has also been established similar to the one now in effect at the Institute. Letters have been mailed to the alumni of Columbia requesting them to send a check for the subscription to the athletic association. Columbia has an estimated expense of \$16,000 over the receipts of all games. Of this sum \$8,000 has been raised by the undergraduates and it is expected that the rest will be raised by the sale of the season tickets.

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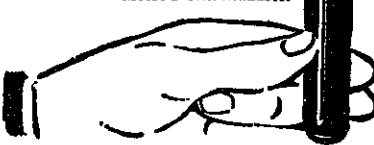
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
