dynamics, and the fuel which supplies the energy for the machine is food. Dr. Wiley believes that man is the animal he is because he has eaten anything that he could get his teeth into. While the speaker believed that man is an omnivorous animal, yet he emphasized the fact that the vegetarians, fruitarians and all the faddists had done their share of good because they had preached against gross abuses, and had forced on the study of dietetics.

Dr. Wiley's final point was the service which chemistry had rendered in promoting morality in trade. Lying advertisements have become so common, and spurious articles are so widespread that merchants do not, in many cases, realize that they are acting dishonestly. Sophistication in articles of trade, and lies in advertisements are easily revealed by the chemist, to the great enlightenment of the public and often of the merchant himself. In this connection Dr. Wiley pointed out the great harm done by the widespread circulation of advertisements for patent medicines which are worthless.

Science, by holding steadfastly to its aim which is truth, has always benefited mankind, and the particular service of chemistry has been to promote public health and public honesty.

After Dr. Wiley's speech, Dr. MacLaurin announced that the next lecture will come on Feb. 23 in room 6, Lowell. The speaker of the evening will be Prof. H. P. Talbot, and the subject of the paper is "The Chemistry of Modern Illuminants."
