## MANAGER PEARSON OF TRACK TO RESIGN

### Hands Over Accounts And Other Track Material To Asst. Benson

Manager Paul H. Pearson of the track team has unofficially announced his intention of resigning from that office. Pearson has turned over to Assistant Manager Benson all his accounts, books, and other material pertaining to the office. His resignation will probably be brought up before the athletic association at the next meeting on Tuesday.

Pearson was assistant manager of the track team last year and at the end of the season was elected manager. His work while trying out for the position was excellent and, in his capacity as manager he was instrumental in securing the intercollegiate cross-country run held at Tech field. He conducted this contest without a flaw. He will not return to Technology this term.

In reply to the question as to whom he would recommend as his successor, Pearson stated that Harvey Benson was the man for the place. However, he expressed a doubt as to the advisability of placing a sophomore in this position. He suggested that Benson finish this year as assistant manager and that he be elected manager at the end of the term to hold the office next year.

## 1913 TRACK MEET

### Seven Events Scheduled For Freshies' Meet Feb. 19 At 2

One week from this coming Saturday, the Freshmen will hold the first track meet that has ever been held by an entering class at the Institute. W. Katzenberger and H. S. Benson, the managers of the 1913 team, have worked hard to make the meet successful. At present there are about thirty entries and everything points to a still larger number before the 19th.

One of the chief objects of the meet is to show what sort of material there is in the 1913 track men. Another reason for arranging this meet is to show the managers and coaches who the best men are. This will enable them to pick a squad which will be able to win Prom. In past years when flowers school teams in the vicinity.

The events scheduled are a 35 yard dash, 35 yard low hurdles, 440 yard dash, 880 yard dash, mile run, shot put, high jump and pole vault. The runs and dashes have proved most popular and in these events the entries are particularly large. All the men on the relay team have entered.

The managers are at present hard at work arranging a number of meets. Lowell Textile, Volkman and other schools will probably be met. A meet with the Sophomores is scheduled for Saturday, February 26th.

All men who have not yet entered for the coming meet should do so at once.
