

FRESHMEN DEFEATED

Harvey Benson 1912, took the lead in the 440-yd. run, and set a fast pace. M. A. Ettinger 1912, followed at his heels the whole time, with R. C. Thompson running third. They finished in the above order.

The shot-put easily went to D. F. Benbow 1912 at 35 feet 9.5 inches. J. L. Bray 1912 and N. D. MacLeod 1913 were second and third respectively.

P. W. Dalrymple 1912 was the only man to clear the bar in the running high jump, over 5 ft. 3.5 in. Dalrymple jumped 5 ft. 8.5 in., establishing a new record for the Gym. The former record was 5 ft. 8 in. W. R. Byland 1913 could not do over 5 ft. 35 in., and C. F. Cairns 1913 and H. B. Alvard 1912 failed at this height.

The 880-yd. run was changed into a 970-yd. owing to a mistake in counting, which made the men run one lap too much. Benson started out in the lead in this event, with R. D. Sampson 1913 following. On the fourth lap Sampson overtook Benson, who was now showing the effects of the two runs in which he had already been a winner. He fought gamely, and although passed by B. Munch 1913 in the next to the last lap, he regained his lost position in the last few yards, and came in second.

E. Mangan 1912 and H. Greenleaf 1912 tied in the pole vault at 9 ft. 3 in. Mangan won on the toss. R. S. Rankin 1913 and W. H. Tarry 1913 jumped

9 ft. but failed at 9 ft. 3 in.

Pole Vault—Won by E. Mangan 1912; H. Greenleaf 1912, second; R. S. Rankin 1913, and W. H. Torrey 1913, tied for third. Height, 9 ft. 6 in.

Shot-put—Won by D. F. Benbow 1912; J. L. Bray 1912, second; N. D. MacLeod 1913, third. Distance—35 ft 9 1-2 in.

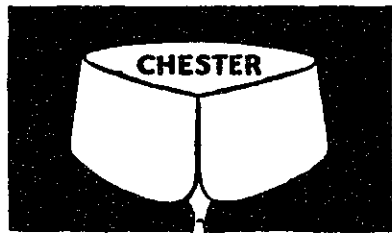
