 ng will be called by President Goodwin of the Institute Committee, together with the heads of all activities of the Institute and the business managers or rearsers of the same, next Wednesday, March 9, at 5 P. M., in room A, the Union. At this meeting the Finance Committee will be thoroughly discussed. It is very probable that some changes will be made in its present arrangement. Inasmuch as there is so much dissatisfaction, the matter will not be pushed until after this meeting. The resignation of F. A. Dewey 1910 from the Executive Committee was not accepted. Mr. Dewey has been on the committee ex-officio as president of the Mechanical Engineering Society, the term of which closes with the annual inner next Tuesday, but inasmuch as he positions on the Executive Committee can be filled from the student body it was thought advisable to let him continue in that office. The resignation of C. P. Kerr 1911 was accepted. Kerr is over points having six for Tech how principal and five for the Institute Committee.

The Musical Clubs presented through manager W. W. Warner 1911, a request for the lowering of the rating of all their officers by two points. Also the request was made that the members be rated at four points instead of five as at present. These suggestions were not accepted by the Committee on the ground that the reason given for the latter was that two members wished to be able to be Tech Show principals and at the same time be on the Musical Clubs. There is no apparent reason why the Musical Clubs should be allowed this privilege any more than the many other societies desiring the same change or an exactly similar reason.

The sub-committee in charge of the institution amendment business reported that of the classes the seniors and freshmen had accepted the proposed measures, the juniors had not accepted them as proposed by the Institute Committee, and that a meeting of the sophomores would be called shortly to consider these measures which had been favorably acted upon by the class directors. A full list of the various actions taken by the organizations will be published the first of next week.

The recommendations of the Institute Committee, which are before all the organizations of the Institute, were brought up and accepted. Mr. Humphreys took occasion to say that he was very glad the club had supported the committee in this matter. He stated that the committee in its relation to student government is of national repute, and that the E. H. S. Club would strengthen itself by its action.

The meeting was adjourned at 9.30 until next Thursday, and in the meantime nominations for officers signed by five members are to be handed in.
