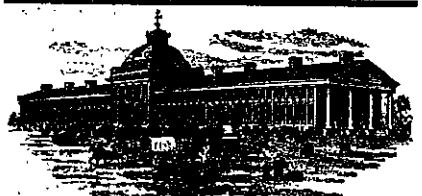

TRACK PROSPECTS

If the men report for work regularly the track outlook this spring is bright. In the sprints, S. E. Reed 1912, J. S. Grant 1912, A. J. Morcom 1913, C. E. Trull 1913, L. B. Walker 1912, J. H. Ruckman 1910, R. B. McEwen 1911, F. C. Dolke 1912, C. Thompson 1913, J. Bernhard 1913, and L. S. Hubbard 1913, have shown promise and should develop into point winners. In the quarter and half are W. C. Salisbury 1911, H. Lockett 1910, P. D. White 1911, R. D. Sampson 1913, M. A. Oettinger 1912, R. H. Gould 1912, C. A. Read 1913, J. D. Mackenzie 1911, W. A. Bylund 1913, C. P. Eldred 1911, and E. B. Germain 1913. Several of these men have been running in fast time indoors and should make a good showing outdoors. Sampson, the freshman half-miler, looks very promising as a coming record holder.

*In the mile and two mile events the Institute can rely on such men as L. O. Mills 1911, H. G. Watkins 1912, H. S. Benson 1912, R. D. Van Alstine 1911, R. M. Ferry 1912, R. D. Bonney 1913, and others.

C. A. Read 1913, R. B. McEwen 1911, J. S. Grant 1912, P. M. Hamilton 1913, W. N. Eichorn 1913, and A. J. Morecom 1913, will be out for the hurdles. In the high jump are Capt. R. H. Allen 1910, P. W. Dalrymple 1912, E. Stuart 1910, F. H. Kennedy 1913, H. B. Alvord 1912, C. F. Cairns 1913, and N. D. McLeod 1913, J. Becker 1912, A. J. Morecom 1913, C. E. Tull 1913, and several others of the sprinters will be put to work on the broad jumps.

W. D. Allen 1911, E. Mangan 1912, R. S. Rankin 1913, and H. Greenleaf 1911 are the probable candidates on the pole vault. Coach Kanaly does not want Salisbury to go out for this event since he is needed more on the quarter.

Mr. Kanaly feels that the crew will not cut down the number of men on the weight events to any extent. Among the many promising men may be mentioned H. S. Gott 1910, J. L. Bray 1912, E. Stuart 1910, D. F. Benbow 1912, H. S. Birchard 1913, O. V. Chamberlin 1912, W. N. Eichorn 1913, and others. Several new men are expected to come out for these events.

At the University of California was recently celebrated what is called "Pelley's day." The coeds have full charge of the events for the day which include boating, fencing, basketball and tennis contests, and which furnish a wealth of amusement for the onlookers.
