

HARVARD LOSES TO RED SOX IN FIRST GAME

For the first game on the home grounds the Red Sox team had the Crimson nine for its opponents. The professional aggregation were up against a stiff proposition, although winning in the end 4 to 1. A large crowd of fans was out in spite of the chill in the air, and they were kept interested from the start. This is the first time in several years that the Harvard team has clashed with one of the big Boston teams and this fact brought many new fans to the bleachers to cheer for the college squad.

Both teams had their best men on deck. Captain Lannigan of Harvard put in the players who will represent the college this season, while Manager Donovan lined up the team which will open the season in New York next Thursday. for the Red Sox, while Hicks put them over for Harvard with Young behind the plate.

No runs were served until the last of the third inning when McConnell crossed the plate on a squeeze play. In the next inning Hooper scored for the professional team. The fifth made no change in the score which now stood 2 to 0 in favor of the Red Sox. In the sixth Harvard made her first and only run when McLaughlin galloped in on a passed ball. The Red Sox completed the score with one run in both the seventh and eighth, holding down the university boys from scoring. The game was judged by league umpires.

Peas are generally canned during June and July, followed by beans and then corn, and arrangements are made for the changing of the machinery for each process.

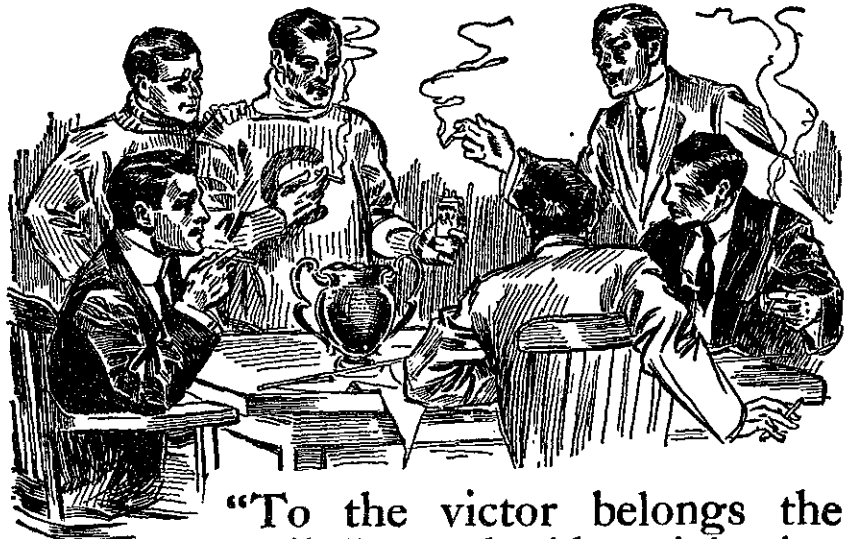
