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The speaker of the evening was President Richard C. Maclaurin, who delivered a short address to the Association. Dr. Maclaurin urged the members of the Association to hold themselves as closely as possible to the ideals of the Association and, by so doing, to correct as far as possible the erroneous impression that a man must be effeminate if he takes an interest in matters of religion. Men should not be kept from connecting themselves with religious institutions on account of the fear of publicly assuming an aim so high and difficult to attain. Rather, they should, in their common aim, find it much easier to approach their high ideal. It is impossible that a man's religion should mean neither very much nor very little to him. Religion is either everything or nothing.

The result of the ballot, which had been taken during the dinner, was announced by John Ahlers 1910, the retiring president. For the coming year the officers of the Association will be as follows: President, W. W. Warner 1911; Vice-President, G. M. Keith 1912; Treasurer, K. C. Robinson 1911.

After the singing of the Stein Song, the annual reports of the retiring officers were read. Retiring President Ahlers suggested an increase in Bible study for the coming year, and greater personal work on the part of each member. Ralph Smead 1910, the retiring treasurer, read the financial statement and reported a small balance with which to start the work next year.

Graduate Secretary Mason urged the members to be yet more active next year, and suggested that each aim to bring ten men into touch with the Association.

At the installation of the new officers, the duties of each, the purposes of the Association, and the membership pledge were read by the graduate secretary.

After the singing of the hymn of invocation, the meeting closed with prayer and benediction.
