

**MINING ENGINEERING.**

**Laboratory Work Still Located in Rogers—Change Soon.**

In accordance with the plan decided upon at the beginning of the year, the course of instruction in Mining Engineering is being given partly in Cambridge and partly in Rogers. Most of the laboratory work, fire assaying and ore dressing are still located in Boston, while all class room instruction is given in Cambridge.

It is expected that after the middle of November fire metallurgy and all blast furnace work will be done in the laboratories on this side of the River. The other arrangements will probably remain as they are for the rest of the year, pending the completion of the Mining and Engineering building.

**CREW PRACTICE.**

**Large Number Go Out in Shells for First Time.**

Almost thirty-five men showed up Saturday afternoon at the B. A. A. Boat House to try out for the positions of oarsmen, coxswains and managers of the various crews. Of this number the freshmen had about twenty, the Sophomores ten, and the two upper classes together five. All, even those who had not rowed before, were given a chance in the shells. A crew had gone up early and brought down an eight oared shell from the Harvard boat house, so that there were two eight and two four-oared shells available. Harvard has been exceedingly generous in offering Technology the use of her shells and it is probable that a Technology Varsity crew made up of the members of the two upper classes will race Harvard during the fall. Also, freshman-Sophomore races are being arranged for Field Day.

Practice will be held today at the boat house at 4.00 o'clock, and at 5.00 for those unable to be out at 4.00. It is imperative that all freshmen and Sophomores going out for crew be there. The men should bring woolen trunks, jerseys and heavy woolen socks. Candidates for managers are to report to Littlefield, '17, in Room 4-108 at 1.20 P. M. sharp today.
