


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STUDENT CONFERENCE
 On October 28 and 29 a conference of the Student Volunteer League of Greater Boston is to be held at Wellesley. BANKING AND SAFE DEPOSIT
 The nearest Cambridge bank to the Institute is the Central Trust Company. Its main office is at No. 599 Massachusetts Avenue, exactly at the easterly entrances and exits of the Central Square Station of the Cambridge subway.

The Central Trust Company is not only the oldest bank in Cambridge—the business having been established in 1826—but it also is the largest suburban trust company in Massachusetts. This institution has built up its business and increased its clientele by the high character of the service it renders to the public.

On checking accounts two per cent. interest is allowed. This bank has always paid four per cent. on savings accounts and interest begins on the first day of each month. There is no limit to the amount which may be deposited in the savings department. The safe deposit vault is on the ground floor and the rates are one-half the Boston rentals. This company also has a large foreign exchange business. The members of the Technology faculty who are storing valuable books and manuscripts can have their books and papers much more accessible by having them in the Central Trust Company vaults. The company calls for and delivers storage without charge.

The business hours of the Central Trust Company are very convenient and will meet the requirements of both the members of the faculty and the students of the Institute. The bank's doors are open every day, except Saturday, from eight A. M. to four P. M., and on Saturdays the hours are from eight A. M. to one P. M. and from six to eight in the evening. Saturday evening all departments are open and all lines of the company's business are transacted.

The professors and students of the Institute will find that the Central Trust Company is mindful of their special needs and that it offers them a banking service that is not only highly efficient, but that is also cordial and neighborly.—Adv.

CHEMICAL SOCIETY
 Trip to United Drug Company Tomorrow at 2.00 O'clock

Tomorrow the Chemical Society will make its first trip of the year, for which sixty men have already signed up. The men will meet at 2.00 o'clock outside the offices of the United Drug Company on Huntington Avenue opposite the Art Museum. The United Drug Company operates a large plant, manufacturing perfumes and pharmaceutical supplies, and men who have had the privilege of visiting the factory in the past report that the trip is very instructive and of exceptional interest. The number of men taken on this trip is limited, inasmuch as the company can only furnish eight or nine guides, and, if it is found that more men sign up than arrangements will permit taking, it is possible that a second trip will be made later in the season.

The committee in charge of trips for the coming season has arranged the following schedule:—Union Glass Company, Somerville; Sturtevant Mill Company, Boston; American Sugar Refinery, South Boston; Middlesex Bleach Dye and Paint Works, Somerville. The trips will be taken in the order named and at the next meeting of the Society the exact date of the trip to the Union Glass Company will be announced. It is also proposed to find out at this meeting the most suitable afternoon for these excursions.


