The dinner broke up at 9.00 o'clock, and the class gathered in the Great Court and snake-danced up the gravel square to the portico of the main entrance. After going around each column the class formed in squad formation, gave several cheers, and marched across Technology bridge. Several street cars tried to cross at the same time but all met with more or less difficulty in obtaining a constant supply of E. M. F. The line marched down Massachusetts Avenue to Boylston Street. Here they requisitioned a push cart and advanced en masse toward Copley Square. Cheers were given in front of the Copley Plaza Hotel and Rogers. The freshmen then marched past the Public Gardens, turned up Tremont Street and advanced toward newspaper row in Washington street. The military aspect of the parade was soon lost in the numerous detours and cheers. However, the survivors got together on Boston Common, snake-danced back on Tremont Street, where they frimed in a T, gave a "Regular M. I. T." and broke up for the night.

OFFICERS' TRAINING CORPS

Captain Downing and Major Cole Outline Plans for Organization at Technology—Graded Course of Instruction Described

At a meeting which was held last Friday for the purpose of reorganizing the Engineer Corps, Major Cole explained that a new law had been passed which provided for military instruction in collegiate institutions that was to be so graded as to meet the needs of each of the four classes. So many orders had been received from the government, and as reach required its individual interpretation, he was unable to state definitely the course which would be given here at Technology; but he suggested that all those who were truly interested in military instruction, and not merely in the novelty of a new system, sign up for a course which would at present be practically a continuance of the old Engineer Corps.

Major Cole then introduced Captain F. B. Downing, Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., who has been detailed here to take charge of the organization of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps at Technology. Captain Downing stated that under the new act of June 3, 1916, the government wished to establish one or more units of this Corps at Technology.

"The principal object of this training corps," he said, "will be to qualify students for reserve officers of the regular army, and to prepare those who elect a military career to hold commissions as officers in the regular army. The authorities of the Institute will retain their supervision and control over the students and all orders and regulations affecting the organization and government of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps will be made by the Professor of Military Science and Tactics after consultation with the Institute authorities. The units organized here will be modeled after corresponding units of the regular army, being formed into companies, platoons, and squads.

Captain Downing emphasized the futility of any man joining who is not in earnest and who does not wish to take the course seriously. All the work will be real work, and if the course is started, it must be continued in a satisfactory manner. It will be noted that there is nothing binding in joining the corps during the first two years and that the training during the last two years is entirely optional. All that is impossible to carry on with full sized materials will be done in model in sand boxes or similar equipment which will be furnished, and every phase of the military subjects which are discussed will be from the engineer's standpoint.

HELD FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Tech Student Accidentally Runs Down and Kills Pedestrian

Last Thursday night, H. L. Wirt, '18, driving an automobile in which were his two brothers and two women, ran into and killed Edward Powers of Cambridge. Wirt is supposed to have been driving about thirty miles an hour on the road between Weymouth and Hingham when he struck Powers. Because of the darkness Wirt claims he could not see the man and was unable to avoid the accident. Powers at the time was leading two horses from an auction stable in Weymouth to Hingham.

Wirt was held in \$1000 bail by the Weymouth police, until his uncle, Atherton Loring, furnished the bonds. Accounts of the accident appeared in the Boston papers.
