In regard to the political campaign, however, The Tech, as an undergraduate newspaper, has no partisan opinions. The field of practical politics, attractive as it is to dabble in, is beyond the scope of our humble efforts though not our inclinations.

CIVIL SERVICE JOB OPEN

Position of Expert Electrical and Mechanical Engineer Open

The Tech has received a notice from the United States Civil Service Commission to the effect that an examination will be held on November 14, 1916, to fill a vacancy in the position of expert electrical and mechanical aid, at \$12.48 per diem, in the Bureau of Yards and Docks, Navy Department, Washington, D. C., and vacancies as they occur in positions requiring similar qualifications.
