taken a deep interest in the well-being of the Club, and has seen it grow in size and influence until last year it numbered among its membership of one hundred and twenty-five, students from twenty-eight different countries. The organization had fulfilled its original Cosmopolitan purpose, the Dean said, as instanced by the enumeration of the nationalities of its presidents. The first was from Norway, the second from New Zealand, then one from Chile, one from Australia, from Syria, Shanghai and the United States. The Dean then spoke of the real aim of all Cosmopolitan Clubs, to remove prejudices between nations, and to promote international good-will.

The next speaker, Mr. Charles Hurrey, Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. Committee on Promoting Friendly Relations With Foreign Students, enlarged on this point. He expressed his conviction that above the opportunities of international trade, treaties or transportation, stood the opportunity of making friends of foreign students for promoting International good-will. And with this idea the Cosmopolitan Clubs Associated was formed, with the motto "Above All Nations Is Humanity."

The last speaker was James Chuan, of the same committee as Mr. Hurrey, and a graduate from Yale, who spoke a few more words on the possibilities of the Cosmopolitan movement.

The list of officers for the current year was then announced: President, S. S. Kwan, '17; Vice-President, Vincent Panettiere; Second Vice-President, Alvarez Nemesio; Secretary, K. P. Hu; Treasurer, Edward L. Clark. The counsellors of the Club are Dean Burton, Professors Seaven and Blachstein.

**INTERCOLLEGIATES**

**Annual Cross-Country Run to Be Held at New Haven**

The annual cross-country run of the Intercollegiate Athletic Association will be held this year at New Haven on the morning of November 25. This event, in which the pick of the country's long distance men will appear, is to be staged in conjunction with the annual Harvard-Yale football game, which is to be played in the Yale Bowl.

On the evening of the same day at a special meeting the association will discuss plans relative to the program of the annual indoor meet. Technology will be represented by a cross-country team, the selection of which will largely depend upon the showing of the men in the coming meet with Harvard.

The well balanced team of the University of Maine won the race last year, which was run under the management of Technology at the Franklin Field course.

**MUSICAL CLUBS COMPETITION**

Competition for the position of second assistant manager of the Musical Clubs started last week, but so far the number of men who have reported is small. In order to give other men interested an opportunity to enter the competition. Manager Kingsbury, '17, will consider any man who comes out during the week. The competition will last until the end of this term, when two men will be selected to act as second assistant managers. The first assistant manager and the manager will both make the mid-year trip with the Clubs, since they have to arrange for the accommodation of the men on the fifteen hundred miles. The average season's mileage of the Combined Musical Clubs is about two thousand miles, covering a large part of New England.

Classes will also be held to teach arithmetic. The T. C. A. asks for six students to take charge of these classes which will be held every Tuesday and Friday evening from 7.30 to 9.30 P. M.

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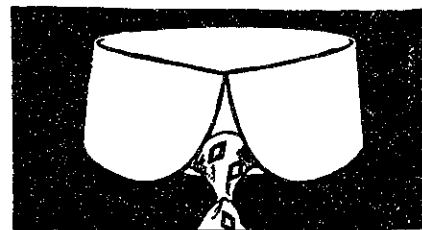
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
