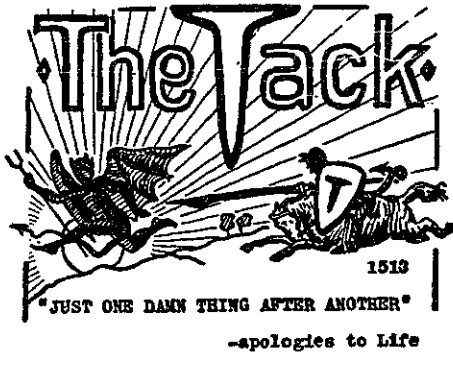

 The State Flag which was presented to the M. I. T. Cadet Corps by Mrs. Richard C. MacLaurin during the dedicatory exercises last year has been received by Major Cole, and on its staff appears the following inscription:

 ALL FORMER TECHNOLOGY  
 STUDENTS"  
 Captain C. B. Appleton, M. I. T., 84, of the National Lancers, was largely responsible for taking the collection for this State flag.
