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## CHEMICALS TO HEAR TALK ON SUGAR

Trip Arranged in Conjunction  
With Subject of Mr. R. C. Folsom's Lecture at Meeting Next  
Wednesday

### ALL INSTITUTE MEN INVITED

The announcement of the next meeting of the Chemical Society goes to fulfill the promise of a successful season given by the record-breaking opening dinner in the "Caf." At this meeting, to be held Wednesday, November 1, Mr. Rufus C. Folsom, Assistant Superintendent of the South Boston plant of the American Sugar Refining Company, will address the guests on the subject of "Sugar and Sugar Refining." As announced at the opening banquet, everyone, members and non-members alike, is invited to attend this and all meetings of the Chemical Society. Refreshments will be served at the close of the lecture.

In connection with this talk, a trip through the South Boston plant has been arranged for, and the talk will be partly in explanation of what will be seen on this trip. The date of the trip will be announced at the meeting.

The trips of the Society are open only to members, but, in accordance with the new policy of the Society, membership is open to every student upon payment of the dues of one dollar. Already one hundred and twenty-five men have joined, and it is expected that last year's unprecedented enrollment of one hundred and eighty will be exceeded.

## HARVARD TRACK MEET

First Contest of Season with  
Crimson Men This Afternoon

As the first contest of this season with their old rivals Harvard, the Technology track team will hold a dual track meet with the Crimson runners at Tech Field this afternoon at 4.00 P. M. Outnumbered in good men in the field events, the Red and Gray men will have to concentrate their efforts on the track contests.

In the short dashes, "Eddie" Teshner, who did nine three for the hundred in a dual track meet at the Stadium last year, is expected to star, although the new material in the freshman class together with the veteran Frank O'Hara should give the Harvard sprinters a good rub for the remaining honors. The Stadium squad will be with out the services of Wilcox, who, it has been reported, has been playing with the Harvard football squad.

On account of the dual cross-country meet with the Cambridge men tomorrow the usual mile and two-mile events will be missing from the meet this afternoon. This provision was made as the whole hill and dale squad of each college will compete over the Belmont course tomorrow, making it necessary for them to conserve their energy by resting today.

When Tech Field was completed a dual meet was held with Harvard, and the Technology runners with only two weeks' practice all but succeeded in defeating the Crimson men. And although the Harvard men got a headstart on the Technology team this fall, the Red and Gray men are confident of success.

### RECEPTION TONIGHT

Graduate Students Will Get Together:

The Walker Club will give a reception to all graduate students and men in the Institute coming from other colleges, of whom there are about 250, who are taking special courses here. The men will gather in the Institute's new library on the fourth floor of Building 10 tonight at 8.00 o'clock. An address of welcome will be made by Dr. W. T. ## MEETING OF INSTITUTE COMMITTEE

Several Absentees at First Meeting—  
New Officers Elected

At the meeting of the Institute Committee yesterday, the following activities were unrepresented: Cosmopolitan Club, Mining Engineering Society, Architectural Society, Architectural Engineering Society, Electrical Engineering Society and the Technology Christian Association. This was rather a long list of absentees especially considering that yesterday's was the first meeting of the newly elected Institute Committee. Realizing that the condition was the outcome of an indefinite system, E. P. Brooks, '17, moved to amend the by-laws so that each activity would be required to notify the Secretary of the Institute Committee that it had chosen a representative to be present at all the meetings, such specified person to be the only one able to represent the activity. The amendment was tabled until the next meeting, since there were several points in it which were not definite.

J. T. Leonard, '18, was unanimously elected Vice-President. R. W. Van Kirk '18, was elected Secretary, pro tem, and L. L. McGrady, '17, was unanimously elected Treasurer.

E. P. Brooks, '17, and W. A. Wood, '17, were elected to serve as members at large of the executive committee.

Some discussion was held concerning the abuses to which the bulletin boards have been subjected this year, such as the placing of commercial advertisements upon them. No definite steps were taken to remedy this trouble.

L. A. Swan, '17, reported a sale of 560 tickets for Tech Night, and a profit for the committee on this sale of \$90. He commented upon the fact that the sale of seats was unusually small and urged everybody to help advertise Tech Night as much as possible, especially to the freshmen, within the few days left.

It was announced that the Institute Committee will in the future have the use of Room 10-213 as an office. This room will also be used by the class governing boards.

It was moved that the three class presidents and the chairman pro tempore of the freshman class constitute a committee for the correlation of Field Day events.

A special meeting on Thursday, November 2, when revision of the by-laws will be taken up, was announced.

Field Day

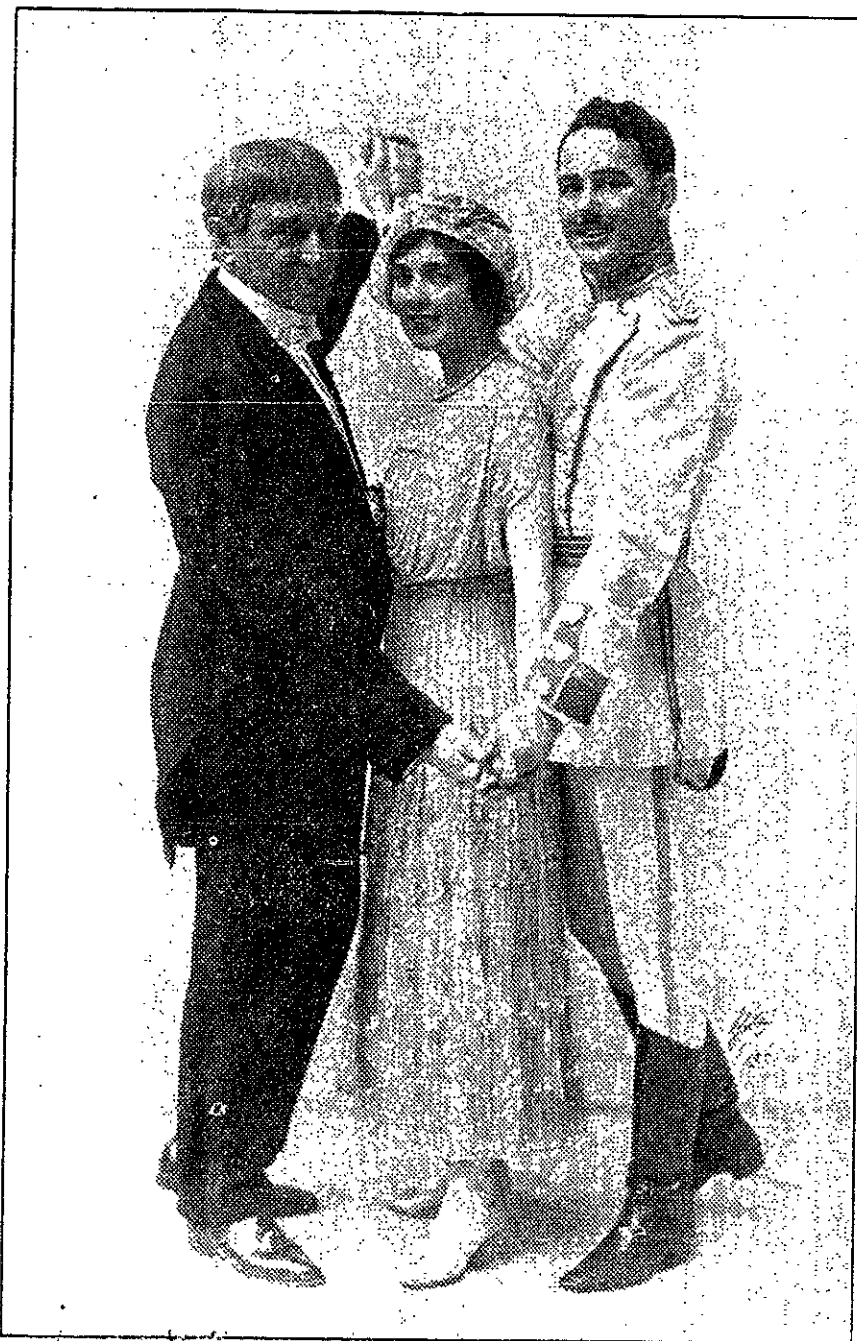

All those intending to participate in the race should walk over the course this afternoon and become familiar with it. The first seven men crossing the line on each team will score.

Although the squad is in good condition, they have not as yet obtained racing form. The team expects to put up a hard fight, but hopes to be in better condition for the Princeton meet on November 4, as hard training will begin this week. Halfacre is showing up well, but is hard pressed by Herzog and McCarten. Many of the men have been hampered in their running through lack of time, but with the remainder of last year's squad as a nucleus Coach Kanaly hopes to develop a star aggregation before long.
