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SHOW COMPETITIONS START

Seventeen Freshmen Competing for Assistant Publicity Manager

The freshman competition for Assistant Publicity Manager of the Tech Show opened Wednesday afternoon. Seventeen men reported at that time to Manager Caird, '18, for the first assignment.

The number of candidates for the position of freshman Assistant in the Publicity Department this year is much below that of former years, but the manager has decided not to delay the competition in order to give more men an opportunity to come out. Freshmen who were unable to be at the first meeting last Wednesday, who desire to enter the competition, may still try out for the department if they report to Room 1-151 at the second meeting of the candidates this afternoon at 5.00 o'clock. It will be necessary for all new men to do the work the others have already done before they will be considered as candidates.

The final selection for the office of freshman assistant in the Publicity Department will probably be made within a month. The first cut in the number of candidates will come within two or three weeks.

At the first meeting of the Sophomores who are competing for the two positions of Assistant Business Managers, seven new men reported to Manager Hutchings, '18. There is a general impression that new men trying out for these positions have not the same chance of being selected as those who were on the Show management last year. This is not the case. The men in this department last year have the advantage of one year's experience, but except for that they enter the competition on an equal basis with any member of the class of 1919. One of the two men selected to act as assistants in this department will become Business Manager of the Tech Show next year, and the second man will be appointed Treasurer; both of these men will be considered for the position of General Manager of Tech Show 1919.

Any Sophomores desiring to enter the competition for the Assistants in the Business Department may meet Manager Hutchings in the Show Office, in Room 1-075, Mondays and Fridays from 4.00 to 5.00 o'clock, and Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5.00 to 6.00 o'clock.
