MASSACHUSETTS INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Constitution

ARTICLE I.

Name. Section 1. The name of this Association shall be the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Athletic Association.

Object. Section 2. The object of this Association shall be to promote and supervise the athletic interests at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The membership of this Association shall consist of the managers of all recognized Institute teams and the three undergraduate members of the Advisory Council.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice President and a Secretary, all members of the Association, and a Treasurer, who shall be the Treasurer of the Institute Committee.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Managers and Assistant Managers of all recognized Institute teams shall be elected by the Association.

Section 2. The undergraduate members of the Advisory Council shall be as follows: the ex-manager of the track team and two others elected by the Advisory Council.

CHANGES IN THE BY-LAWS OF THE M. I. T. A. A.

ARTICLE I.

Section 3. The duties of the Secretary shall be to keep an accurate account of all the proceedings of the Association and to issue notice of meetings.

Section 4. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to take charge of all moneys of the Association and to keep an accurate account thereof.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. A quorum shall consist of three-fifths of the members of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

All payments of money to teams shall be made only by the Treasurer of the Athletic Association. Petitions for money for teams must be submitted in budget form by the respective managers to the Budget Committee of the Institute Committee. These budgets, if approved by the Budget Committee, shall be forwarded to the Institute Committee. On the further approval of this body, the money may be obtained from the Treasurer, who shall forward it to the team in amounts desired.
