**INTERNAL COMBUSTION ENGINES**

A course of lectures on gas gasoline and oil engines (252) will be given by Professor Riley on Thursdays and Fridays at 4.10 P. M., commencing Nov. 16, in Room 3-470. The men then lined up and practiced several starts, after which each candidate swam 100 yards. There are several men who average between eleven and thirteen seconds for the 25 yard swim. It is not necessary for candidates to be members of the Boston Y. M. C. A. or the T. C. A. to swim in the tank until the first cut in the squad is made. However, a charge of ten cents is made for each swim.

no obligation except that of attendance.

The curriculum of the Institute has necessitated the reduction of this work from five to two hours per week. However, Capt. Downing expects to obtain recognition from the War Department later on, notwithstanding the fact that the amount of work being done is less than that required of members of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps.

President MacLaurin is taking up the matter with the War Department to see whether some of the other work in the Institute's curriculum cannot be applied to make up for the five hours per week as required by the War Department for reserve officers' training.

Membership in the Engineers' Corps will not put a man under obligation to the War Department for any active service.

The work for the present will be carried on in Room 3-270.

**RIFLE CLUB**

The Technology Rifle Club has again issued a call for candidates. At present only eighty men have reported for the club and it is hoped by the management that the number will reach one hundred at this call. Any member of the club can compete for a place on the team and also for the qualifying buttons of the National Rifle Association. The officers of the club wish to impress upon those having a desire to join the club that no previous experience is required and that there is room for everyone who wishes to learn to shoot.

The team will make its regular trips to the range this week but in the very near future these trips will have to be given up as the weather is becoming too cold and the light bad. The management is at present looking for a suitable indoor range, and it is possible that the use of the Armory will be obtained or that the basement of the dormitory will be fitted up as a range.

The Rifle Club will hold a smoker within the next few weeks; all members or prospective members are invited. The membership dues are a dollar and a half a year and one dollar initiation fee, and guns and ammunition are furnished free by the Federal government.

**BILLY SUNDAY NIGHT**

The T. C. A. announces that one hundred and fifty out of the original thousand tickets for the student night at the Billy Sunday Tabernacle still remain. There is a large demand for tickets at the T. C. A. office and Mr. Cushman requests that those who have tickets and do not expect to attend return them. A number of fraternities will be present in a body. E. Radcliffe Stevens '17 will lead the Tech men in cheering. Tickets will not be accepted at the door after 7 o'clock.

**OFFICERS' SWORDS**

More than half the swords are still out. This probably resulted from the fact that the officers were on duty until the last day of the dedication.
