 cessful and the onslaught of technique continued.

The one shining light on The Tech team on defence was Meader. Techniquers tried play after play through the center of the line, but were stopped in every instance by Meader. Clarkson faked on several punts because this stellar back broke through. He also made a spectacular end run chasing after Clarkson when the latter made one of Technesneague's touchdowns.

Owing to an agreement before the game both teams were gentle in their tackling and there were only about ten men who suffered. Coyne of the techniquers is confined to his bed with a sign over his right eye and Littlefield or The Tech was unable to leave his cot owing to the work of a vicious kick from one of the sniques who thought he was practicing soccer. 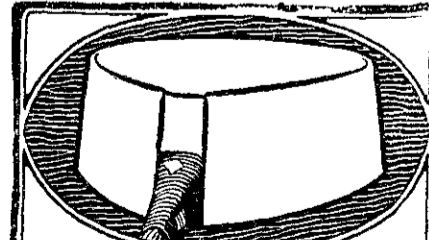
