The concert is scheduled to start at
8 o'clock. As a delay in starting will
mean that the time allotted to dancing
will be cut short, the audience should
be in the hall and seated at that time.
As previously advertised, the concert is
going to be varied, short and snappy.
The clubs have been working hard for
this concert and in preparation for the
mid-year trip, and the management as-
sures a good concert.

The management requests that direct-
ly after the concert everybody leave the
hall as soon as possible, and circulate
in the lobby and lounging rooms. This
will greatly facilitate the removal of
the chairs and the platform, and will
make it possible to start the dancing
much sooner.

As in former years, the hall will be
divided into a number of alphabetical
sections. Men will be expected to stay
in the section of the letter with which
their last name begins, between dances.
For instance, John Doe would stay in
section D, and Henry Smith in section

S. Men whose names put them in sec-
tions late in the alphabet should look
up partners whose names preceded. For
instance, Smith would look up Doe, and
Brown would look up Anderson. This
system saves much confusion at the be-
ginning of each dance, which otherwise
would take place.

Dancing will start as soon as the
hall is cleared, and will continue until
2 o'clock. There will be an intermis-
sion at about 12 o'clock when refresh-
ments will be served. Lowe's orchestra
of eleven pieces will furnish the music,
and an attractive program has been ar-
ranged.

Dance orders may be obtained at the
office of the Musical Clubs in the base-
ment of Building 1, between 5 and 6
o'clock tonight, and at a table in the
lobby of Building 10, between 1 and 2
o'clock tomorrow. As the number of
orders is limited, only one order will be
given for each ticket. Tickets must be
presented in order to obtain orders.
