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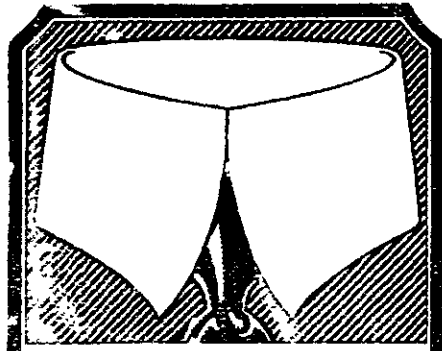
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**PRES. MACLAURIN APPOINTS MISS BABCOCK GARDENER**

President Maclaurin has announced the appointment of Miss Mabel Keyes Babcock '08 to plan the garden which is to be a feature of the President's new residence. Miss Babcock has designed many well-known gardens and also prepared one of the frieze panels in Huntington Hall. She received the degree of M. S. at the Institute in 1909 and is president of the M. I. T. Woman's Association. Since graduation Miss Babcock has been on the Faculty of Wellesley College and in private practice.

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**HUMAN VALUES IN INDUSTRY**

**R. H. Rindge Gives Talks to Students on Handling Men**

Mr. R. H. Rindge gave a very interesting talk to about 75 students last Friday afternoon. The subject of his talk was "Human Values in Industry," and dealt mostly with the labor problem and how to combat it. He said that although technical school students were very well trained in technical matters, they knew very little about handling men, which was an essential thing in a factory. The best way to learn how to handle the laborers, he said, was to join an English class for teaching foreigners. This, he said, taught men to handle the laborers sympathetically and enabled them to get much more work out, than if they had not had previous experience.

Mr. Rindge continued his talk at 4 o'clock the same afternoon, and talked about forming classes for this work. The students who attended were much interested in his plan, and 33 signed up. These talks will be continued by Dr. Tupper, who has spent several years in Europe studying the men in their own environment, and who is thoroughly familiar with the situation. He will speak on Fridays at 4 o'clock every week. The Alumni Council have secured Mr. Rindge as their next speaker for March 26.

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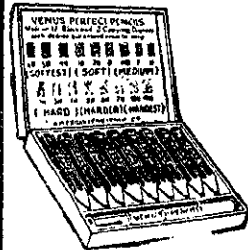
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
