CONDITION EXAMS TO BE GIVEN IN JUNE

Hereafter all condition examinations will be held in September, just preceding the opening of the school year, and in March, during the one-week's vacation which will come in the middle of the second term. This arrangement has been made so that condition examinations, which will come in December and June following out the new schedule adopted by the faculty which provides for a ten-week term ending in December, and a twenty-week term, ending in June. The object of the new schedule is to lessen the load carried by students just before examination period, by holding condition examinations at a different time.

The faculty will make provision for students due to take condition examinations in June, of this year. Students concerned are strongly advised to consult their instructors, or department heads, and learn the time and nature of the examinations which will be required.

In announcing the new schedule for two terms of ten and twenty weeks, superceding the old schedule of two fifteen-week terms, the faculty call attention to the savings of two months' time for entering students whose work show that they will have to drop out at the end of the first term.

The new schedule follows:
 September to December, 1st term, 10 weeks.
 December, Semester examinations, vacation of one week.
 December to June 2nd, term, 20 weeks.
 March, 1st term, condition examinations, vacation.
 June, final examinations.
 September, 2nd term, condition examinations.

CHANGES ARE PROPOSED FOR INSIGNIA RULES

A recently drawn-up proposal for the change of insignia rewards follows:

I.—Automatic Award of T
 (a) "Winners of the points at the annual meet of the N. E. I. A. A. or I. C. A. A. A. shall read: 'Winners of eight points or more at the annual meet of the N. E. I. A. A. or two points or more at the annual meet of the I. C. A. A. A.'"

(b) "Scoring members of a winning cross-country team or any man making twelfth place or better at the I. C. A. A. A. or eighth place or better at the N. E. I. A. A. run" shall read: "Members of a cross country team making twelfth place or better at the I. C. A. A. A. or fifth place or better at the N. E. I. A. A."

(c) Add the following: "Winners of two points or more at the annual meet of the Intercollegiate Swimming association, winners of eight points or more at the annual New England Intercollegiate Swimming championships, members of 200-yard relay teams making 1.43 or better in intercollegiate competition."

II.
 Under Additional Insignia the rule "No student shall be regarded as eligible for qualification for additional insignia until after beginning his third academic year" shall read: "Until after beginning his second academic year."

III.
 Under Special Award of T the paragraph "The first man in a dual or first and second in a triangular intercollegiate meet, and the first and second in a dual or first, second and third in a triangular intercollegiate cross-country run" shall be struck out.

The rule reading "Members of a basketball, hockey, or wrestling team who participate in not less than two-thirds of the games of one season" shall be amended to read: "Members of track, swimming, cross-country, tennis, or wrestling teams who participate in not less than two-thirds of the games of one season."

3. "The manager of the track team" shall read: "The managers of the track and swimming teams."

IV.
 Under the Automatic Award of the A. T. A., the phrase "Winning teams in Intercollegiate relay races" to be struck out.

V.
 Under the Discretionary Award of Insignia, paragraphs relating to basketball team and hockey team shall be struck out.

To the following: "The S. T. T. shall be awarded to members for a swimming team who participate in two-thirds or more of the meets in one season and to the manager" shall be added: "Winners of first place in open class meets, winners of points in dual or triangular intercollegiate swimming meets and manager of the swimming team."

VI.
 Under Class Numerals the paragraphs relating to baseball team and basketball team shall be struck out, and there shall be added: "Members and managers of winning swimming team in annual class contest."

VII.
 Finally, under the caption of Technology Field Day Awards shall be added: "To members, substitutes, and manager of both crews."

The rule "The first six to finish of the winning class in the annual Freshman-Sophomore Cross-country Run" shall be struck out.

The other rules to remain unchanged:

way routes in short hauls. He mentions here the fact that \$500,000,000 has been appropriated for highways by the United States government for 1919, an increase of \$200,000,000 over the largest appropriation before the war.

Professor Blanchard is the author of several treatises on the subject of highway engineering. His latest book is a highway engineer's handbook which came out last January. He had among his associate editors in this work two Boston men, A. W. Dean, chief engineer of the Massachusetts Highway Commission and John E. Rablin, engineer for the Metropolitan Park System.

Professor Blanchard is president of the National Highway Traffic and of the American Road Builders Association. He was a member of the advisory committee on state highways in New York, appointed by Governor William Sulzer, is consulting highway engineer for the Board of Water Supply, New York, consulting engineer on bituminous pavements for the office of the commissioner of public works of the borough of Manhattan, consulting engineer to the New York and Pennsylvania state highway departments, a member of the advisory board on highways, New York state department of efficiency and economy. He was U. S. reporter to the 2d International Road Congress at Brussels, 1910, and to the 3rd International Road Congress at London, 1913. He was U. S. Representative on the International Committee on standard tests for highway materials, 1914.

He is a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the Societe des Ingeieurs Civils de France, the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, the International Association for testing materials, the International Association of Road Congresses, the American Society for Municipal Improvements, National Highways Association, American Highway Association, Rotary Club, Engineers of New York, Delta Tau Delta, and Sigma Xi.

COLLEGE NOTES

COLUMBIA—Columbia college registering a larger number of students than in any other previous year of its existence is back to its old basis. About 1500 students are registered in the college. Another school of the university that has been given a tremendous increase in registration with the return of the peace basis is extension teaching with 6000 students taking courses in that branch.

McGILL—Canadian universities are finally able to announce an athletic schedule which compares with the one of the pre-war period. After an interruption of almost five years, a special meeting of the most prominent Canadian universities was held early this month at Kingston, to which McGill, Toronto, Queen's, Royal Military college and other universities sent representatives. Definite plans for the coming season were discussed and it was decided to resume all intercollegiate athletics next fall.

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
