TECHNOLOGY AIR SERVICE CLUB IS ORGANIZED

Fliers Meet at Hotel Lenox for Election of Officers

The service was well represented at the banquet of air service men Friday evening at the Lenox. Fourteen former pilots, observers and balloonists of the army, navy and marine corps were present, men who had helped win the war in the United States and abroad, and several of whom have one or more German planes to their credit. Aside from the immediate object of bringing together members of the Institute who have the common interest of service in the air forces during the war, the banquet was held to consider the entry of a Technology team in the aero meet to be held at Atlantic City in May.

After dinner Paul Sheeline '19 described the events to be held at the meet and read letters he had received regarding Technology's participation. The prospects of getting planes or balloons were discussed informally. Assistance is expected from the airplane manufacturers, as the Atlantic City meet is the first large meet to be held in this country by other than professional fliers, and the extensive use of aircraft for sport purposes is not assured as yet.
