

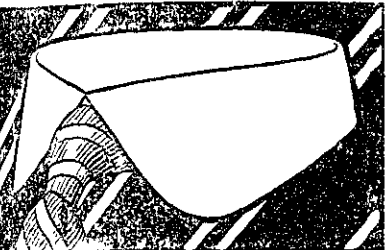
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### AIR SERVICE ORGANIZES

### FRESHMAN WRESTLERS WIN FROM SOPHOMORES

Friday afternoon the freshman wrestling team won from the Sophomores by a score of 25 to 15. While there were very few spectators to encourage the two teams, the bouts were all interesting, and some good material was brought out on both sides. Perhaps the greatest surprise of the afternoon was experienced when the freshman star, Barnard, was thrown by Lin. While Barnard was not in particularly good condition, the bout was fast throughout, and it seemed at one time that the freshman would get a fall out of his man. During the last two minutes, however, Lin by quick work managed to throw his opponent with a body hold. The most exciting bout of the entire contest was between Gordon of the Sophomore contingent, and Butler, captain of the freshman team. Both men were in good condition and worked continually for a fall, Butler using his rolling hold, known by all those who have seen him wrestle, to advantage several times. In spite of the fact that he had Gordon in position for a fall on these occasions, the latter cleverly managed to squirm out in time before a fall could be declared. When the end of the period was finally called, both men were on the offensive, but Butler got the decision, having had a little the better of his opponent throughout the bout.  
 By winning from the Sophomores, the freshmen have distinguished themselves in that they have not lost a bout this season. Several of the next year's team will probably come from this group, so that the management has some very good prospects for the next season in this direction alone.
