him inside stuff that he thinks no one else knows about. I got on to this fact by noticing that any time I began to kid the other acts on the bill, telling intimate details about them, the same instinct that makes people buy newspapers

would make the people out front sit up and take notice. They would laugh and lean forward and take a new interest in what I was saying the moment I got personal about the other players, because they felt they were getting news about the performers, you see.

"When I came to the Winter Garden I at once saw my great opportunity. A long narrow 'runway' extended from the front of the stage, out over the orchestra chairs to the very back row. It was supposed to be used only by the chorus girls as they paraded up and down it. But the moment I saw it I knew it gave me a big chance.

I used it to get confidential with the audience by running up and down on this platform, stopping for a chat with people, and by kidding the audience and the performers in general. And the effect of this method of entertaining or of selling my goods has been truly remarkable."

NEW SUBMARINE CHASER RESEMBLES HUGE SPIDER

When the armistice was signed, the United States, through Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, and under the direction of the navy department, had developed a boat for submarine chasing and scouting that threatened to revolutionize that branch of warfare it was disclosed today by Dr. Bell.

This boat is a mechanical flying fish. It rides entirely clear of the water, rising above the water when a moderate speed is attained, and is capable of far greater speed than any other type of boat designed, according to the claims of its inventor.

Dr. Bell declares the boat has proved a success in every way. He claims that with proper engine equipment it would be by far the fastest type of boat in the world, and that its performance was not affected by adverse weather conditions.

He has been working on the "flying boat," at his laboratories on his estate, Beinn Bhreagh, near Baddeck, Nova Scotia. The boat resembles an enormous spider moving swiftly across the water. The principle is that of the airplane. It has airplane engines and propellers, but its wings are small and are submerged instead of being spread in the air like those of a hydro-aeroplane.

The "flying fish," with which the final experiments were made, had a cigar shaped body, 60 feet long and capable of seating two or three persons comfortably. Two airplane engines were mounted above and one on either side of the skiff body with small pontoons below them.

Dr. Bell called his boat the H-D 4. The navy department kept a close watch upon all experiments with it and so did the Canadian government.
