"Its author completely agrees with the professor, and more than that, he gives examples to justify the Latin-American suspicion of their northern neighbor, and advocates a continuance of such imperialistic penetration." In closing Mr. Zubiria said that the aim of his organization was the development of a closer union among the Latin Americans at Technology with a view to spreading it later on among their respective countries, bound as they naturally are by language and customs.

The other student speaker was J. A. Beeche '19. Mr. Beeche was at the Institute when the Latin American club was formed three years ago and has always been an active member. He spoke of the beginning of the club and its development.

Mayor Andrew J. Peters spoke of the trade relations between the United States and Latin America and of the need of a good understanding between the two peoples. Mayor Peters was well fitted to talk to the Latin American Club because he has been to South and Central America and knows conditions there. He frequently referred to his trip.

President Maclaurin advocated a warmer appreciation of the Latin Americans. Both he and Professor Passano, who represented the faculty, were loud in praise of the Institute.



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
