Saturday, he will undoubtedly win the half-mile event. O'Leary of N. H. State who ran the 880 in fast time against Tufts last Saturday will give Bawden a fight, but the New Hampshire watches that clocked him at 2 minutes, 4 4-5 seconds can not be depended upon.

Savage of Bowdoin is without dispute the best man entered in the high and low hurdles. His records show him to be consistent in these events and he is looked upon as an easy winner.

The mile run will be the feature of the day. Leath and Nightingale of New Hampshire are the best men entered. Nightingale should in the opinion of Coach Kanaly, cross the tape in better than 4 min. 30 sec. Sullivan of Holy Cross will also figure in the mile.

Nightingale of New Hampshire should take the two mile event with Leath his teammate and Murray of Technology as close contenders.

In the fields events there will be keen competition. Nagel of Technology will probably win the pole vault at 12 feet, with Walter as a runner-up.

Dandrow of Technology is the best entry in the hammer throw. To win he will not have to do over 135 feet.

Judging by past performances, Anderson of Williams looms big as a winner in the high jump although Captain Pierce and Ash of Technology should also figure in this event. The broad jump will more than likely go to Wagner of Wesleyan. Although he did but 20 feet 3 3-4 inches in a dual meet with Brown on Friday, he is credited with over 23 feet in a meet earlier in the year. Nichols of Brown is expected to gain first honors in both the shot put and discus throw. In the first event he will be contested by Rollins of Technology while in the latter event he will have to fight Anderson of Wesleyan and Andrews of New Hampshire State. Tickets for the meet are on sale daily in the Main Lobby from 12 to 2.

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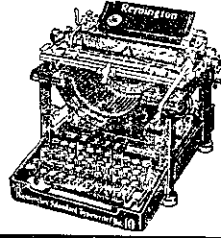
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
