

NEXT DORM DANCE IS TO BE FOR ENDOWMENT FUND BENEFIT

Johnson Will Have Eight Pieces—Many Novelties Promised

The second Dorm Dance promises to be another of those jazzy, snappy affairs where everybody has a wonderful time and talks about it for the next month or so. The students will again lay aside the beloved work for the big event which is coming on Friday, November twenty-eighth. The entire net proceeds of this dance are to be given to the Endowment Fund and for this

reason the price of admission for this dance only, will be raised to \$1.50 per couple. The tickets can be obtained from the Dance Committee at the Dorms, which consists of R. T. Pender '20, R. L. Turner '21, and T. M. Gill '22. They will also be on sale at the Co-operative Society store and in the Dining Hall of Walker Memorial.

Walter Johnson will be on hand with eight of the snappiest musicians ever. Besides the two extra pieces he will also have better men than last time. There will be two novelty dances during the evening and refreshments will be served in a new way. Instead of

having a regular intermission where everybody gets in line, steps on his neighbor's toes and is miserable on general principles. Dancing will be continual and refreshments will be served at three different times in the evening. The dancers will eat their refreshments in the Grill room or else they may sit out and watch their friends dance. Tickets went on sale Wednesday and from all indications they are going fast. The Dorm Dance Committee hopes to give the Endowment Fund a big boost as a result of the record attendance expected.

Kraft '22, chairman of the committee for the same, it promises to be a huge success. The invitations sent to various men who are prominent in undergraduate activities have been practically unanimously accepted. In addition to the regular numbers it is hoped to have a feature dance, including a dancing contest.

Plans are under way whereby the Cleofan and Walker Clubs will unite efforts to produce an entertainment, probably in the form of playlets, to be given in the early part of December for the benefit of the Endowment Fund Campaign. It is hoped that the services of Professor Rogers will be procured.

Much agitation has been in evidence from the "fairer sex" in regard to the use of the Walker Gymnasium for one hour per week. They have gained the approval of Mr. Kanaly and are awaiting a reply from the Dean regarding the same before making definite arrangements. Their only fear is that any barriers which the janitor erect will be shattered by the mob of "interested spectators."

A movement is also on foot to have Cleofan pins, and it is expected that designs will be submitted at the next meeting, which will be a tea given by the Association on Friday, December 5.

While the dance is the only event which is certain of realization, it is quite probable, judging by the enthu-

siasm shown by the members of both clubs, that the plans for the entertainment will also materialize.

J. L. Mott, Princeton '15, Speaks on Student Convention

J. L. Mott, Princeton '15, son of Dr. J. R. Mott, head of the Y. M. C. A., was at the Institute on November 4 and 5 to arouse enthusiasm for the Student Volunteer Convention to be held at Des Moines, Iowa, from December 31 to January 4. He spoke informally of the convention at luncheon in the Delta Kappa Epsilon house, and at dinner in the Sigma Alpha Epsilon house. On Thursday, November 6, at the Institute Committee meeting it was voted that Technology be represented by a full quota. A committee to look into the matter, composed of Dean Burton, Professor Pearson, N. G. Ab-

bott '20, W. R. McKenny '20, S. Wells '20, and Secretary W. M. E. of the T. C. A. was appointed.

The Institute will be allowed to elect thirty undergraduates, one member of the Faculty, and the secretary of T. C. A. Notices have been sent to men chosen to represent the Institute. These men held a meeting with committee in the Dean's office on November 12. Ways and means of meeting the expense of approximately \$2 per man will be devised later.
