SUBMITS REPORT ON STUDENT TAX

The following report has been submitted by W. L. Cofren '20, treasurer of the Institute Committee, concerning the complete Student Tax returns from October 1, 1919, to December 1, 1919. This report shows that 2681 had paid their tax up to then and that about 75 more payments were expected during the month of December. It also gives an itemized account of the appropriations necessary for the maintenance of all the dependant Institute activities. The Institute Committee at present has about \$2425 available for the current year expenses.

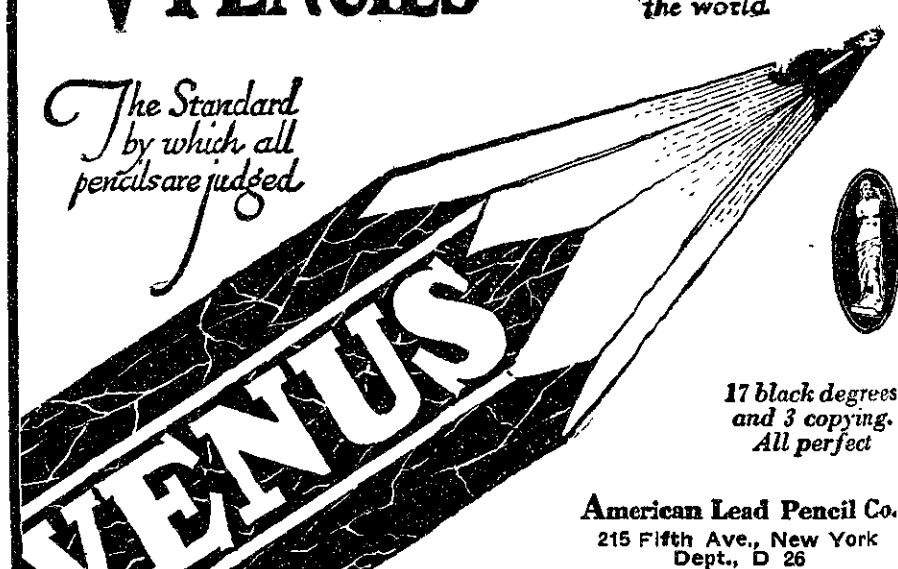
