**YALE WINS EASTERN INTERCOLLEGIATES**

New Haven Mermen Capture Big Swimming Meet with Total of 35 Points—Technology Fails to Place in Finals

**PENNSYLVANIA TAKES SECOND**

Yale succeeded in amassing a total of thirty-four points out of a possible fifty-five at the Eastern Individual Intercollegiate Swimming Championships held at New Haven, their home grounds, last Saturday night, completely overcoming Technology, N. E. I. I. champion, and the other eight entrants.

It was understood a week ago Saturday, when Technology annexed the New England title, that a number of Yale's best men were competing in another meet at New York, but the work of last Saturday night was totally a surprise.

Out of the ten colleges entered, Technology, Harvard, New York and Rutgers failed to score. Pennsylvania was second with 8 points, Princeton scored 6, Amherst 3, Wesleyan and Columbia tied with 2 each.

Yale took first place in all but one of the five events. Shields of Pennsylvania won the century from Capt. Hinks of Yale in the last ten yards. Dick Meagher, Yale, who holds the intercollegiate record for the plunge, was beaten by his team mate, Wood, who did 75 feet in 52 1-53.
