junction with the Institute Committee and be responsible to the Advisory Council.

After thorough discussion of the matter the Council was favorably impressed, and Dr. Rockwell, speaking for the body, voiced approval of the project.

Further counsel was asked of the Council in the matter of eligibility. The M. I. T. A. A. proposes to pass a ruling which will prevent any man who receives a mark of "F" or "L" in fifty per cent, of his work from continuing in athletics.

It was pointed out to the council that while this matter was taken care of ultimately by the Dean it would be a distinct forward step in student government if such a ruling were adopted by the M. I. T. A. A. To this

the council agreed and sanctioned the move without vote.

A new form of managership competition was proposed by Rollin F. Officer '21, president of the M. I. T. A. A. which would assure experienced men being placed in charge of the athletic teams at the Institute. The competition will start in the freshman year and at the end of six weeks, three men will be chosen who compete as second assistant managers throughout their first year until at the start of the second year, two men are chosen first assistant managers and these in turn compete for manager in the third year. A new form of recommendation for the managership positions was also discussed and the question was raised whether the manager should be permitted to recommend one man for his successor or to submit to the M. I. T. A. A. the qualifications of each of the candidates.

**BASEBALL TEAM IS WARMING UP**

**Squad Works Hard in Preparation for Big Game With Tufts Varsity—Position of Coach Still Vacant**

**SQUAD STILL GROWING**

There are now about forty candidates for the 1922 baseball team practicing daily on the cinders of Tech Field, between the hours of 4 and 6. Favorable weather conditions warrant that the team will be well conditioned for their first tilt on Wednesday, April 7th, with Tufts College varsity, at the latter's home grounds.

The number of candidates is increasing daily, and it is expected that enough men will be on hand a week from next Wednesday to put the first game over well enough to show that baseball at Technology is more than a lunch-hour pastime.

The teams are now working on batting and battery practice until the diamond is in good enough condition to allow a practice game. Altogether a bright season is looked forward to, the only handicap to the smooth running of the teams being the lack of a coach.

It is almost impossible to obtain the services of Nash '20, who coached the team last year, as he is not in school this term. How long the teams can get along without a coach is a question.

The complete schedule of games will appear in THE TECH next week. There is a large schedule for both the Sophomore and freshman teams, and anybody interested in the national pastime is asked by Manager Donald Walch '22 to report within a few days if he wishes to take part in the games.

The freshman manager competition will be over in about two weeks, and the successful assistant managers will then be named.
