## WILL HOLD CARNIVAL

Boxing Team Has Invited Many Colleges to Attend

The management of the Boxing team announces that it will hold a carnival in the Walker gym on April 9, from 3.45 to 6 o'clock. Harvard, Boston University, Tufts and the University of McGill in Canada have been invited to participate. At the present time no answer has been received from any of them.

From 3.45 to 4.15 there will be a bout between the fencing teams of Harvard and of Technology. The important part of the program, the boxing bouts, will therefore not begin until the classes in the Institute are over. If none of the other colleges should attend, there will be a series of exhibition bouts by the members of the Institute boxing team. The M. I. T. A. A. will award boxing belts to the winners.

Announcement is made of a meeting of graduate managers on April 30 in Philadelphia. At this meeting the Intercollegiate Boxing Association will be organized. Technology will be represented.

### PAVILION CLOSES

With the exception of afternoon and evening skating classes being held by the Boston Skating Club, the Ice Pavilion was closed to the public at noon Tuesday.

In announcing the closing of the pavilion, Manager Woods added that considerable enlargements would be made to the skating area before re-opening next fall. The rink is to be widened from 52 to 80 feet, and by removing the end stands, a total length of 200 feet will be secured. At the same time additional seats will be provided, enabling the house to accommodate 2,500 people.

The management said the past season was highly successful despite a late start and other handicaps.

### TENNIS TEAM ANNOUNCES SCHEDULE FOR SEASON

The management of the Tennis Team intends to call for candidates as soon as the courts are ready. This will probably be about April 15. No work can be done until the frost is entirely out of the ground. The new courts will not be completed until the middle of the summer. There is a great deal of good material in this year's team as most of last year's men are back again.

"By that time, the students will fail to realize that there were ever athletics at Technology. They will study hard for their degree and then will look back as alumni, and ask 'Why are we different than the Dartmouth alumni?'"

"The natural sources of the location of Technology must be developed; the river, the skating rink, the fine field and, moreover, the enormous man-power. I wish this organization, which is dedicated to that purpose, prosperity in its first efforts."

### Club Elects First Officers

The construction of the club was then read and accepted provisionally, subject to ratification. It provides for a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer; it provides for an executive committee, a publicity committee, an entertainment committee and an investigation committee and states that the object of the club will be to promote athletics, morally and financially.

Officers for the ensuing year were then elected. J. W. Kellar '21, is president, I. D. Jacobson '21, vice-president, W. J. Young '21, secretary, and Waldo Adams, treasurer.

The membership campaign will start with a mass meeting of all students of Technology, in 10-250, at 1 o'clock on Thursday, April 8. Every student is eligible for membership.

In closing the meeting, President Kellar said that he felt that he had the full support of his fellow-officers, and if they obtained the full support of the student body, the success of the Technology Athletic Club was assured.
