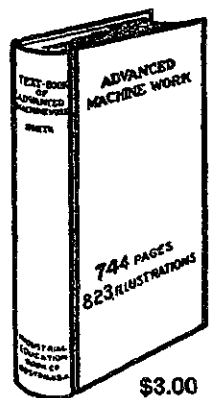

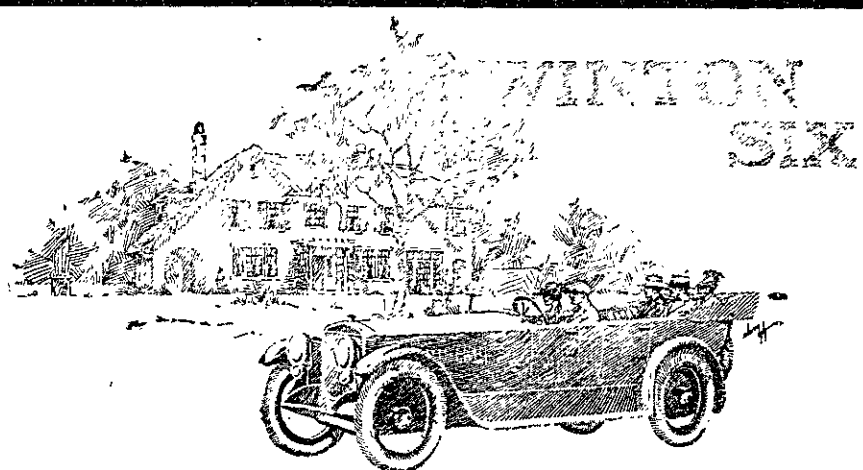

## AWARD CONTRACT FOR T. C. A. HANDBOOK WITHIN FORTNIGHT

New Book Will No Longer Be Known As "Tech Bible"

The men in charge of the T. C. A. handbook for next fall report that the work is progressing rapidly. The bids for the books have been received, and the contracts will be awarded within the next fortnight. The cost of each book this year is from 40 to 50 cents as opposed to the 20 to 25 cents of last year. Because of the increased cost only 1500 copies are to be printed instead of the 2500 put out last fall. This number is to supply the incoming freshmen and the men transferring from other colleges. The committee has decided that the name "Bible" as attached to the handbook shall be abolished, and "handbook" or some similar term be substituted.

## ENTHUSIASTIC FANS MAKE TENNIS PROSPECTS BRIGHT

About 35 freshmen tennis enthusiasts attended the meeting last Wednesday which was held for those wishing to substitute that sport for the regulation gym work. The interest evinced augers well for a successful season. The manager, C. W. Bursar Ford expects that work will be started on the home courts as soon as the frost leaves the ground and that they will be in condition within a week or ten days after that time.

The first game is slated with the Boston English High School and it is hoped to have the team picked by that time. The team will be decided by a series of games, which will not be in the form of a tournament.
