COMBINED SOCIETIES HEAR HULL MANAGER

Mr. J. D. Andrews Tells Details of Ship Construction at Hog Island Yard to Combined Professional Societies

ATTENDANCE VERY SMALL

Mr. J. D. Andrew, manager of hull construction at Hog Island, delivered a very interesting talk to a very small audience in the north hall of Walker Memorial last Friday under the auspices of the combined professional societies. He spoke of the construction of the Hog Island plant and the building of the ships.

Talk Illustrated by Slides

Mr. Andrew's talk was illustrated by lantern slides, the first of which showed a poster made in 1799, urging a shipbuilding policy. Then Mr. Andrews showed pictures of Hog Island before it was taken for shipbuilding, and explained that the major part of the island lay so low that an elaborate draining system had to be installed before the construction of the ways could be begun. He took up the construction of the ways, and the rest of the plant in considerable detail, pointing out that all the transportation systems had to be made while they were being used.

Different Method Used First

Next Mr. Andrew took up the building of the ships themselves, saying that the bridge-manufacturing concerns which were idle at the beginning of the war furnished the plates of which the vessels were made. He explained that these concerns made all the flat pieces first, so that the first ship turned out was built up in the middle first, and was in consequence much more expensive than the later ships, which were first built up at the ends. However, he added, the expense was justified by
