Institute Committee Appoints Members to Start Club at Technology—Will Investigate Clothing Prices

### DORMS ALREADY HAVE CLUB

It is not the aim to form an overalls club as it is believed that such an organization would lead to the purchase of overalls by many members and thus thwart its own intentions.

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## GENERAL SWIFT LECTURES ON AMERICA'S PART IN WORLD WAR

Regular Military Science Talks Replaced

The regular Sophomore lectures in Military Science have been discontinued for this week, and in their place Brig-Gen. Eben H. Swift, formerly commander of the 82nd Division has presented an illustrated lecture on "Features of the American Campaign in the World War." The lecture was given for the first time on Tuesday evening, and was repeated on Wednesday.

Gen. Swift devoted the greater part of his discourse to a resume of the activities of the American forces from the time they first landed in France until the date of the armistice, illustrating with colored maps the positions of the various forces from week to week. Following this, two reels of motion pictures were exhibited which showed different branches of the service in action. The regular lectures in room 30.102 will be resumed on May third.

## HAVE AIRPLANE AT NEXT A.E.S. DANCE

Real Commercial Flyer Will be Assembled in Walker—Gage's Orchestra Furnishes Music And Entertainment

LIMIT DANCE TO 150 COUPLES

The committee which has charge of the dance of the Aeronautical Engineering Society in Walker next Friday evening is rapidly completing the arrangements for it. The big feature of the evening is the large commercial airplane which is to be assembled in the main lobby.

Instead of admitting 200 couples as previously announced the committee is compelled to limit the dance to 150 couples as the airplane is a large one and will cover considerable of the space ordinarily available for dancing. Tickets are on sale at the Technology Branch, in the Walker, and may be had in the main lobby for \$1.75. Members of the society may secure a rebate of 25 cents if they show their ticket and membership card at the desk in the main lobby.

The music will start at 8.30 and will continue until midnight with a short intermission at 11 o'clock for refreshments. In addition to the airplane the committee is endeavoring to secure some vaudeville acts, the talent of which is to be supplied by members of the Tech Show cast. The programs of the dance are to be in a unique form and shape. In all probability the music will be furnished by Frank Gage's Orchestra. The committee in charge of the dance is composed of J. M. ## HAVE TWO SPEAKERS

Professional Societies Hear Worth While Talks

The next talk of the series given under the auspices of the Combined Professional Societies will take place in the north hall of Walker Memorial on Wednesday evening. There will be two speakers, J. R. McElvany who has charge of the labor at Hog Island, and Dr. E. A. Young who has charge of the health department at Hog Island.

Mr. McElvany who dealt with the labor at Hog Island will speak on "Industrial Relations." H. G. Dooley '20 the publicity man of the Combined Societies pointed out that as the handling of labor is essential for an engineer this talk will have especial interest for all men at the Institute.

### Dr. Young Will Speak on Health

Dr. Young will speak on "Industrial Health Methods." She was in charge of the health department at Hog Island. The prevention of disease, the purification of the water supply, and like problems were among those handled by Dr. Young.

The Combined Professional Societies are planning to enlist the cooperation of the professors of Course XV, business administration and Course XI, sanitary engineering. This action will be taken as it is expected that these talks will be particularly vital for the men in those two courses.

Finally those in charge wish to emphasize the importance of Mr. McElvany's talk for all men at the Institute, as nearly all employers consider the handling of labor of the highest importance.

With a banquet to look forward to in the next two weeks and a four hundred dollar pledge to the Technology Educational Endowment Fund paid, members of Tech Show 1920 are proclaiming their production the most successful Show the Institute has ever witnessed. To support their contention they are able also to point to full houses at all performances.

The banquet is the big thing now in the minds of the members of the cast, chorus, ballet, orchestra and management who will be permitted to attend. The Show's guests at the feast will include lyric writers, poster, score cover, and scenery designers, and the costume committee.
