Institute May Enter Crew in American Classic

If the showing at the informal races which the Institute Crew hopes to arrange with Harvard and other crews about Boston warrants it, the crew will be entered in the American Henley on the Schuykill on May 29. E. T. Steffian '22, manager, has received an invitation to the American classic and the Institute authorities are favorably disposed toward it if the crew shows sufficient promise. Races with Harvard crews and with clubs' crews whose headquarters are on the Charles River are expected to furnish the necessary tests.

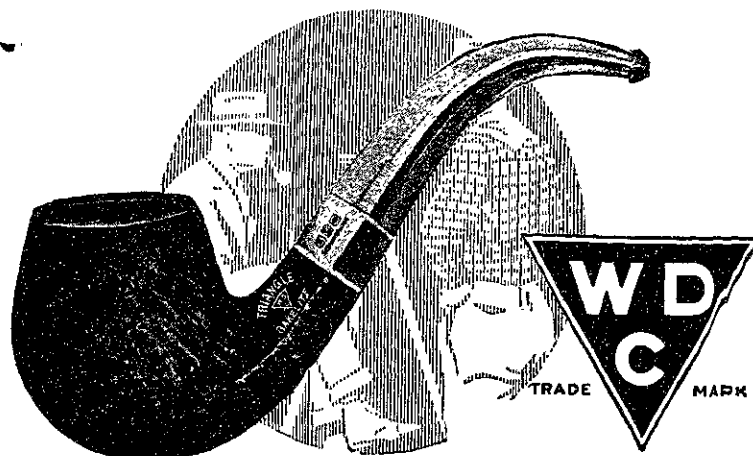
