work of undergraduates exclusively, the only outside help being that afforded by the coaches and the staff of the theater. This activity is organized on strictly business lines and begins the preliminary arrangements early in the autumn term. By the Christmas holidays a scenario has been chosen and recruiting is begun for cast tryouts. Rehearsals, costume making, and scenery construction occupy the second term, culminating in the production of the year's offering during Junior Week.

The organization and production of the show is in the hands of a general manager, business, publicity, and stage managers, a treasurer, and their assistants. The position of a general manager is held by a Senior who has been connected with the show in his three former years at the Institute and has held the position of business, stage, or publicity manager or treasurer in his third year. At the close of each year, these four meet and choose one of their number to succeed as general manager the following season. His work consists of making all contracts and generally supervising the work of the four departments.

Business Department

The business department comprises a business manager who is a Junior, three Sophomore assistants and three freshman assistants. One of the Sophomores is detailed as assistant to the general manager and of the remaining two, one is picked for business manager and the other for treasurer of the next year's show. This selection is on a competitive basis, being decided by the value of program advertising turned in by the competitors and also by their general attitude and usefulness. In the same way, freshmen for the department are picked from the large number of competitors who try out for the position every year.

The work of the business department is to print and publish the program and musical score and arrange transportation for the annual trip to Northampton. In addition to this, the department assists in the sale of tickets for the Boston performances.

Stage Department

The stage department is managed by a Junior as stage manager and he is assisted by two Sophomores and two freshmen. As in the business and other departments of the show, the positions are won by a competition which is handled by the stage manager. This department has charge of the actual production of the show, including preliminary rehearsals and the selection of the cast, chorus and ballet, the costumes, scenery, lighting effects and other properties.

Publicity Department

The publicity department has charge of all advertising and pictures of the show, and selects and prints the poster and cover for the program and music score. The organization of this department comprises a Junior publicity manager together with two Sophomores and three freshmen assistants. Their work is to let the members of the cast, chorus and ballet know when and where rehearsals are held, and at the time of the production of the show to make it as widely known as possible. This is done by posters, newspaper articles, and general advertising.

The treasurer of the show is a Junior and handles all finances and the ticket sales for all performances. Whatever assistance he may require is furnished by the business department.

The members of the cast, chorus, and ballet are selected by a competition which starts early in December and lasts for about a month. The men are picked solely by their merits and the keen rivalry that exists every year brings out the best talent there is at the Institute.

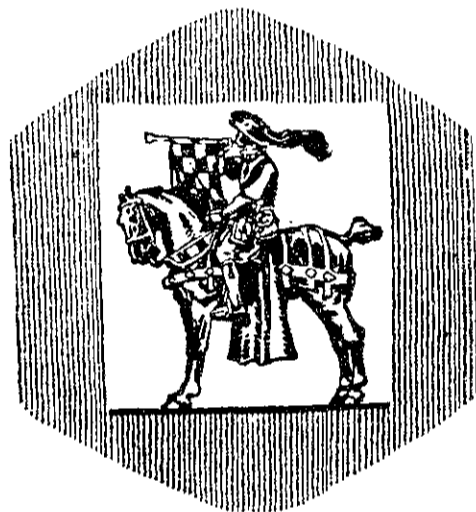
